Dr. F. A. Smith Speaks on Japanese Work at Successful Meeting

Eighteen kindergarten chairs were pledged at the successful meeting held yesterday afternoon under the direction of the Woman's Interdenomination Missionary society, with Dr. F. A. Smith as the speaker. The program took place at the First Presbyterian church with one hundred and fifty in the audience.

For a quarter of a century Dr. Smith was actively engaged in missionary work in Japan and Korea. At the close of that period he was directed to take charge of the Japanese work on the Pacific coast. Dr. Smith feels that the most vital work of any that can be done is concerned with the "younger generation"—the Japanese children who are American-

born. Through them,—46,000 in number,—the coast must realize an incalculable force.

Dr. Smith appeared in Salem at a particularly auspicious time since the Woman's Interdenomination Missionary society is engaged in establishing a kindergarten. It was particularly heartening that a total of eighteen chairs were pledged at the meeting yesterday.

Dr. Smith plans to help select a site for the proposed kindergarten while in Salem.
