

Badgers and Bearcats To Mingle In Final Conference Hoop Contest

WILLAMETTE MAY TIE WITH WHITMAN

Hard Game Anticipated by Spec Keene; Whitman Claims Title

The last chapter in the Northwest conference basketball race will be written Friday evening, when the Willamette university hoopers meet Pacific university in the Willamette gymnasium.

If Willamette wins, of which Coach Spec Keene is by no means confident, it will be tied with Whitman College for the conference championship, but reports from Walla Walla indicate that the Missionaries will be opposed to an extra game or series to decide the title.

News stories emanating from the Whitman campus reveal that Coach Nig Borstke's team is disposed to claim the championship on the basis of two extra games played with College of Idaho. Whitman played four games with that school and won them all. On that basis Willamette could still schedule as many games as it likes with Linfield, say, and take the title if it happened to win them all. This, of course, would not decide the conference supremacy any more than did Whitman's four games with another of the tall end teams.

Quarrelling with Whitman about a tie that hasn't yet occurred, is not the thing uppermost in Mr. Keene's mind this week. The Bearcat mentor went to Forest Grove last week end to see Pacific and Puget Sound play, and he came back with a fixed notion that the Badgers are going to be hard to stop when they come here Friday.

Pacific, it will be recalled, ran up the biggest score on Willamette, of any team in the conference, 45 points, when they met at Forest Grove earlier in the season. The Badgers apparently had no trouble in solving the Bearcats' defense, and it was only by scoring still more points that Keene's men managed to win.

Pacific's quintet is a five-man aggregation, with no individual stars. Mills and Emerson share the honors as forwards; Pollock is a steady performer at center, and Miller playing a flashy floor game and specializing in long shots, while Coon does the heavy defensive work.

The game Friday night may be the last college contest local fans will have the opportunity of seeing at home this season.

BIDS FOR HIGHWAY WORK DUE THURSDAY

State Highway Commission to Meet in Portland and Consider Offers

Proposals for the construction of new highway, bridges and furnishing materials will be opened at a meeting of the state highway commission to be held in Portland Thursday and Friday, March 3 and 4.

Projects for which bids will be received follow:

Baker and Union counties—La Grande-Baker section of Old Oregon trail. Furnishing 20,865 cubic yards of broken stone and crushed gravel for maintenance purposes.

Clackamas county—Multnomah County Line-Beaver Creek section of the Mt. Hood Loop highway. Furnishing 8500 cubic yards of crushed gravel for maintenance purposes.

Clatsop county—Lewis & Clark River section of the Roosevelt Coast highway. Construction of 3200 square yards of concrete or bituminous pavement.

Klamath county—Sand Creek Hill-Williamson River section of The Dalles-California highway. Furnishing 7000 cubic yards of broken stone for maintenance materials.

Sherman county—John Day section of the Columbia river highway. Construction of embankment approach to bridge over John Day river, involving approximately 1300 cubic yards of embankment materials.

Tillamook and Yamhill counties—Neskowin-Hebo-Gra and Ronde section of the Roosevelt coast highway and the McMinnville-Tillamook highway. Furnishing 30,000 cubic yards of broken stone for maintenance purposes.

Wasco county—The Dalles-Dillon-Dufur section of the Columbia river highway and The Dalles-California highway. Furnishing 9000 cubic yards of crushed gravel for maintenance purposes.

Benton county—Bridge over Rock Creek on the Alsea highway near Alsea, requiring approximately 100 cubic yards of excavation, 180 cubic yards of concrete, 35,000 pounds metal reinforcement and 250 lineal feet of handrail.

Benton, Clackamas, Marion and Linn counties—Construction of 8500 square yards of concrete pavement on nine short sections of the Albany-Corvallis highway and the Pacific highway in Benton,

Clackamas, Marion and Linn counties.

Clackamas County-Beaver Creek-Rhododendron section of the Mt. Hood Loop highway. Furnishing 20,000 cubic yards of broken stone for maintenance purposes.

Curry County-Pistol River-Chetco river section of the Roosevelt coast highway. Removal of slides and building up of settled embankments. Work involves approximately 59,000 cubic yards of excavation. Length of project 23.2 miles.

Deschutes County-Redmond section of The Dalles-California, McKenzie and Ochoco highways. Furnishing 5100 cubic yards of crushed gravel for maintenance purposes.

Jefferson County-Madras-Opal section of The Dalles-California highway. Construction of one mile of broken stone surfacing and the furnishing of broken stone for maintenance purposes.

Lincoln County-Siletz Bay-Otter Rock section of the Roosevelt highway. Construction of 12.75 miles of broken stone surfacing. Requires approximately 42,000 cubic yards of broken stone or crushed gravel for maintenance purposes.

Polk and Yamhill counties—Grand Ronde-Sheridan section of the McMinnville-Tillamook highway. Furnishing 25,000 cubic yards of broken stone or crushed gravel for maintenance purposes.

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standing bonds.

For poultry feeding experiments under the direction of the extension department of Oregon Agricultural college the committee appropriated \$10,000.

An additional appropriation of \$800 was authorized for the Oregon mining bureau. This money will be used to transfer a truck and other equipment now at Baker to the Oregon Agricultural college. It was said that the truck has been stored at Baker for several years.

The committee recommended an appropriation of \$7000 to cover the states' share of pavement abutting state property in Corvallis.

For artesian well experiments in Harney county the committee appropriated \$8000. This appropriation was recommended by members of the state land board and James Stewart, field investigator for a number of state departments.

It was alleged that if these wells prove successful the state would reclaim several farms which had to be taken over by the state through loan foreclosures.
