

RABBI, PRIEST AND MINISTER TO UNITE

Prayer Formulated Which Acknowledges Common Fatherhood of God

URBANA, Ill., Feb. 24.—(AP)—Rabbi, priest and minister have cooperated in formulating a prayer acknowledging the kinship of the faith and the common fatherhood of God. It was published today by its authors, the Rev. John A. O'Brien, pastor of St. John's Catholic church; Rabbi Benjamin Frankel, director of Hilliel Foundation, and the Rev. Jas. C. Baker, pastor of Trinity Methodist Episcopal church, all of Urbana.

The prayer: "Almighty God, we who are members of different races and faiths, desire to gather thy fatherhood and our kinship with each other. In our difference we find that many of our hopes, our fears, our aspirations are one. Thou art our father and we are thy children.

"We are heartily sorry for the mist of fear, envy, hatred, suspicion and greed which have blinded our eyes and thrust us asunder. May the light that comes from these scatter these mists, cleanse our hearts and give health to our spirits, teach us to put away all bitterness and walk together in the ways of human friendship.

"Open our eyes to see that as nature abounds in variation, so differences in human beings make for richness in the common life. May we give honor where honor is due—regardless of race, color or circumstance. Deepen our respect for unlikeness and our eagerness to understand one another, through the deeper unities of the spirit in sympathy, insight and cooperation. May we transcend our differences. May we gladly share with each other, our best gifts and together seek for a human world fashioned in good under thy guidance. Amen."

STILL DISCOVERED IN AUMSVILLE RAID

One high grade copper still, three gallons of moonshine whiskey, 25 gallons of mash, and the arrest of Richard Sargent, Aumsville farmer, was the result of a raid made by Sam Burkhardt and Walter Barber, deputy sheriffs, Thursday morning.

Receiving a tip that liquor was being made and sold at the Sargent place, a mile east of Aumsville, the officers found the still in the attic of the house, operating at full capacity. Besides the still, a new copper boiler which had not yet been installed was also taken. Sargent was brought to the county jail and will be tried this morning before the justice of the peace.

This is the second still to be seized within a week by county officers. Levi A. Harris, Gates lawyer, was nabbed last week, receiving a stiff fine and a three months jail sentence.

MARDI GRAS OPENS AT NEW ORLEANS

Momus, Deity of Joy and Mirth, Reigns at First Parade and Bill

NEW ORLEANS, La., Feb. 24.—(AP)—Momus, deity of joy and mirth, love and laughter, throw open the doors to the Mardi Gras carnival here tonight with the first parade and the first major ball of the season.

Under thousands of electric lights lining the streets, glowing in radiant streamers from Canal street buildings and forming a brilliant canopy over the other principal streets, Momus led his parade of a score of elaborate floats depicting the legendary adventures of Nils.

Hundreds of negroes garbed in colors of the rainbow served as torch bearers for the monarch as he led his Krewe from its den in Callopie street through the city to open his ball at the Athenium.


