Mrs. Thayer, who is spending the winter in Los Angeles, is an honorary member of the writers' club.

Included in the special features were two vocal solos by Miss Naomi Phelps and a short and very authoritative talk on "Literary Standards," by Prof. H. C. Koehler of the Willamette university English department.

The group was exceedingly interested in hearing the conclusion of Mrs. Gertrude Robinson Ross' novel, "Night to Harvesting," which she read early in the program.

Prof. Morton E. Peck read a poignant philosophical poem, "Looking Backward," based on impressions aroused by the sight of a desolate old woman on the shore.
