Germany Soon to Match America in Ice Cream Use

Low cost of production, labor, and materials said to prevail in Central Europe does not extend to ice cream manufactured in Germany even when this original American food product is manufactured by American machinery and methods. Herr Charles Horvor, an ice cream manufacturer of Frankfurt-on-the-Main, recently visited this country with the stated purpose of discovering methods whereby he might increase production in his American equipped plant and so lower the cost of ice cream in Frankfurt from \$1 a quart to something near the price charged here.

Mid-European ice cream manufacturers are adopting business organization of American standards just as they are importing machinery. The Middle European Ice Cream association now boasts 40 members and is growing. Germany will soon be matching the United States in its consumption of our famous frozen dairy food.

CLACKAMAS COWS SLAIN

100 Head Slaughtered After Test for Tuberculosis

OREGON CITY, March 4.—One hundred and ninety-six head of cattle infected with tuberculosis have been found and destroyed in Clackamas county under the recent state law requiring that all cattle be tested. Dr. C. H. Seagraves, county herd supervisor, said today.

There were 16,502 head of cattle tested, making the county's percentage 1.2. This compares favorably with the rest of the state and is said to be much lower than the United States average, 2.5 per cent.

MARINES IN CHINA TO STRETCH LEGS

March Through Streets of Shanghai Planned; Riot Suppressed

SHANGHAI, March 4.—(AP)—Some of the American marines, who will have an opportunity to stretch their legs in a route march through Shanghai tomorrow, today had a preliminary call to duty in the international settlement. A squad of Chinese soldiers took a Standard Oil company launch and started to take it down stream. An American naval officer was notified and 60 marines were sent in pursuit. They overtook the Chinese soldiers after a chase of five miles and recovered the boat without any firing. The soldiers, although armed, quietly surrendered their prize.

Tomorrow's big march through Shanghai which will be made by half of the marines now billeted aboard the transport Chaumont, will be for the sake of exercise, it was explained, and not as a show of force.

While the military situation in the civil war continued to center around the Shantungese forces of Marshal Chang Tsung-Chang, who now is the chief defender of Shanghai against the invading Cantonese, a strong protest was made to the senior foreign consul against the stationing of British troops outside the boundary of the international settlement. The protest was made to the Chinese commissioner for foreign affairs in Shanghai, who asked immediate withdrawal of the troops.

Marcus H. McCall Passes Away at State Hospital

Marcus H. McCall, who on December 25, 1916, shot and killed William A. Shaner, Portland barber, in a barber shop in the basement of the Morgan building, died in the Oregon state hospital for the insane here yesterday. The body was buried in City View cemetery.

McCall was received at the state hospital on May 29, 1917, following trial on a charge of first degree murder. Attorneys for McCall alleged that he was insane, and referred to him as a paranoiac. During the trial McCall told of his travels through various western states and declared that he was pursued by enemies who behind his back, Shaner had discharged McCall on Saturday night previous to the murder.

The shooting was witnessed by a number of persons, among whom was McCall's 7-year old son.

McCall was 49 years of age. Physicians said his death was due to heart disease.
