

Southern Oregon Team Shows Up Well in Defeating Tillamook Quintet

MEDFORD HI WINS CONSOLATION GAME

Southern Oregon Champions Show Real Fight and Have Easy Time

The Medford high school basketball team showed its real strength for the first time in the state tournament here, by defeating Tillamook high 35 to 15 in the final game for the consolation trophy Saturday night.

Archer and Melvin, Medford's crack forwards, were not to be stopped even by Tillamook's close checking guards. Archer led with 17 points, making eight field goals. Medford took the lead quickly, and was never threatened. The score at the end of the first half was 15 to 5.

In order to win the consolation cup, Medford had to play three games Saturday, yet it appeared as fresh and full of fight in this final game as it had at any time in the tournament.

Loring, center, continued his effective passing and defensive play, but essayed few shots at the basket, and Anderson was as speedy as ever.

Medford's victory was a triumph of the fast breaking style of attack over the percentage game. Tillamook was unable to get inside Medford's front line, even with the remarkable criss-cross play which it used so effectively against other opponents.

Page, guard, and Mahan, center, were Tillamook's outstanding players in this game.

MEDFORD QUINTET WINS IN AFTERNOON

Team Defeats Astoria and Marshfield Successfully; Tillamook Wins

Tillamook and Medford high school quintets won their way to the consolation finals in the state tournament by decisive scores, Tillamook defeating La Grande 32 to 13, and Medford winning from Marshfield 29 to 8, after disposing of Astoria in the forenoon, 23 to 11.

Although Tillamook and Medford were doped to win these games, the ease with which it was done was a surprise, and in the case of La Grande and Astoria, it can be attributed only to the combination of fatigue and their long distance style of scoring.

When players become even slightly tired, their long range shots are bound to suffer, and this was best exemplified in the failure of Lyman, La Grande, and Makinen, Astoria, to connect with the basket in these games, as they had done previously.

It is true also that they were marked men, and had few chances to shoot. The same applies to Norberg of Marshfield.

Medford and Tillamook won because they were accustomed to working the ball in close and not depending on long range accuracy, although the style of Holden, Tillamook forward, was mostly of medium length. However, these teams appeared fresh enough despite the numerous games they had played. The games that Medford played were shortened to six minute quarters.

The distinctive feature of Medford's games was the coming into prominence of Anderson, guard, who played a remarkable floor game and did his share of the scoring.

COCHRAN CAPTURES BILLIARD CROWN

WASHINGTON, March 12.—(AP)—Welker Cochran, 30-year-old Hollywood, Cal., real estate dealer, won the world championship 18.2 ball line billiards tournament tonight by defeating Jake Schaefer of Chicago, 400 to 180.

One of Schaefer's setbacks was administered by Eric Hagenbacher of Germany, who in matches won and lost was tied with him for second place.

Although he had been a threat in several tournaments, Cochran never before had won the championship. His victory tonight gave him a final standing of five victories and one defeat, that at the hands of Willie Hoppe of New York, the champion.

Previous to their match to-night Cochran and Schaefer, twice champion, were tied for first place.

of play, and cheered the victors strenuously when the Thomas E. Wilson trophy, a silver engraving of a basketball player in the act of shooting at the basket, was presented by Austin Landreth, president of the state high school athletic association.

Salem received the cup for second place, and Medford that for winning the consolation tournament. Landreth complimented the teams and their supporters on the good sportsmanship shown, and commended the excellent handling of the tournament on the part of the Willamette university athletic authorities.

Terrific speed, both in passing and checking featured the first eight minutes of the championship game, with each team able to score but one field goal. After several minutes of fruitless struggle, Eberhart of Eugene looped the basket from the middle of the floor; Segmund countered with a spectacular running shot from the side. Eberhart got the only other point of the period on a free throw. Both teams missing several of these.

The second period was the deciding one, for Eberhart got another basket, Hornor shot two and Pitman one, along with two more free throws by Eberhart and Colbert; while Salem's scoring in this quarter was confined to three free throws.

After the intermission the two teams fought on an even basis, with something to thrill the crowd every few seconds. At the end of the third quarter Salem was just four points behind and had held the visitors scoreless for several minutes; but in the last period Eugene came through with more of those graceful loops that never seemed to even touch the sides of the basket.

Strange to say, it was Rubenstein, the substitute, who went in when Colbert was retired on personal, who put the game on ice for Eugene with two pretty running shots.

The work of Lewis, Eugene youth who guarded Duffey and held him to only one basket, and of Drager, who corralled the ball whenever it dropped in Salem's end of the court and prevented any follow shots, was the most striking feature of the long periods when neither team was able to score.

Official Executioner of All Mountain Lions

GLACIER PARK, Mont.—(Special.)—Once a year Harry Thol, United States forest ranger, following his bloodhounds, makes a snow shoe trip of 320 miles through the Rocky Mountains of Glacier National Park to help kill off the mountain lions which prey upon the park deer and elk.

He now is in the Rock Mountain region engaged in the slaughter of these predatory animals and is expected to return from his annual hunt in March.

United States government hunters' warfare against mountain lions in Glacier National Park has been reduced to a minimum the ravaging work of these rapacious animals among the deer family. Each winter however, a few carcasses of elk still are found in the mountain recesses of the park.

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
