FIREWORKS ROUT ROOSTING BIRDS

Thousands of Starlings Are
General Nuisance to Build-
ings Each Year

READING, Pa. — (AP) — A nightly roman candle barrage to rout thousands of starlings from their roosting place on the steeple of Christ Episcopal church is under way here.

Firemen swinging from ropes outside the steeple set off the fireworks, while other firemen inside the steeple are armed with buckets of water to put out any fires that may develop.

The frightened birds flee, screaming, from the brownstone tower in such numbers as to momentarily obscure a huge electric sign 150 feet away.

The starlings come every year, defacing the church, post office, and nearby buildings. Previous efforts to drive them away from residential sections by firearms and beating of tinware proved ineffective. This year only half the starlings returned after the first night of roman candles. The church vestrymen say the campaign will be continued until the birds are vanquished.

POSTPONING DENIED

JUDGE BEAN REFUSES TO PUT
OFF KLAMATH CASE

PORTLAND, March 12. — (AP)

Despite a strong plea by defense counsel, Federal Judge Bean today refused to put over the conspiracy case against A. D. Lambert, William Barnes, L. D. Rice, J. R. Evanson and Jack Miller, all of Klamath Falls, until next October when the court holds its

regular session in Medford. Miller has not been apprehended and the defense attorney based his plea upon the fact that he would be needed to establish the entire case, and particularly, Lambert's defense.
