LONDON, Mar. 17.—(AP)—Fears of a possible leakage of secrets connected with Great Britain's biggest submarine are believed to have prompted the admiralty to request the arrest of Lieutenant Commander Collin Mayers, on the retired list of the navy. Notice is hereby given that the Common Council of the City of Salem, Oregon, deems it necessary and expedient, and hereby declares its purpose and intention to improve North Fourth street from the north line of Belmont street to the south line of Market street, in the City of Salem, Oregon, at the expense of the abutting and adjacent property, excepting the street and alley intersections, the expense of which will be assumed by the City of Salem, Oregon, by bringing said portion of said street to the established grade, constructing Portland cement concrete curbs, and paving said portion of said street with a six-inch Portland cement concrete pavement, twenty-four feet wide, in accordance with the plans, specifications and estimates therefor, which were adopted by the Common Council March 7, 1927, now on file in the office of the city recorder and which said plans, specifications and estimates are hereby referred to and made a part of this notice. The Common Council hereby declares its purpose and intention to make the above described improvement by and through the street improvement department of the City of Salem, Oregon.

Written remonstrances may be filed with the city recorder of said city against the above proposed improvement within ten days from the date of final publication hereof.

WCTU CELEBRATES UNION SIGNAL DAY

Mrs. J. J. Nunn Presides at Program Given Before Bi-Monthly Meet

At its bi-monthly meeting this week, the WCTU celebrated Union Signal day by an appropriate program of music, readings, etc. Mrs. J. J. Nunn presided, Mrs. A. O. Condit acted as secretary, and Mrs. Fessenden played the piano accompaniments. Members responded to roll call by reading brief reports of work being done in the various states.

The "Union Signal," official organ of the WCTU, contains sound logic, recital of benefits, rehearsals of fasts, plans for workers; stresses constructive methods and indisputable benefits of prohibition; in short is a splendid periodical, educationally, with highest ideals of journalism.

From the current issue were read excerpts from an article by the federal prohibition commissioner, citing the mere infancy of national prohibition (but seven years old) in comparison with a generation of time taken for other great world-movements for public uplift and betterment to get into operation; that in spite of difficulties disclosed, remarkable advances have been made, conspicuously in improved conditions of prosperity increased, health improved, child welfare promoted, and commitments to penal institutions for drunkenness and its attendant evils diminished.

Attention was also called to the gigantic campaign of misleading propaganda on by the "wets" to deceive the people; in spite of which, the commissioner showed, the splendid results go steadily on; as attested by the business, professional, fraternal, religious and educational organizations of the country.

An interesting sketch was given of Gen. Neal Dow, and his monumental contribution to national prohibition.

On Tuesday, March 29, a silver tea will be given at the WCTU room, to which the public is invited. The proceeds will be applied upon the piano fund. Mrs. Carruthers and Mrs. Fessenden were appointed to arrange a program, to which a contribution by guests will be welcomed.
