Mr. and Mrs. De Beck, Pioneers of Canada, Celebrate Golden Wedding in Salem

Two Canadian pioneers, Mr. and Mrs. George Ward De Beck (Emma Mary Keary), had the distinction of celebrating the fiftieth anniversary of their marriage in Salem on the day the magnificent new bank building, erected by their son-in-law, Mayor T. A. Livesley, opened its doors to the public. Mr. and Mrs. De Beck are house-guests at the home of their son-in-law and daughter, Mayor and Mrs. T. A. Livesley (Edna Keary) from Vancouver, B. C., where they have made their home since their marriage half a century ago. Romantic details attended the marriage of George Ward De Beck, promising Canadian lumberman, and his bride, Emma Mary Keary, who has the distinction of being one of the first white children born in New Westminster. While both were Canadian-born, they left New Brunswick and were married on American soil—a significant gesture that seemed to foreshadow the role that the United States should play in their lives in the years to come, when one of their daughters married Thomas A. Livesley and became "the first lady" of her city. Mr. and Mrs.

De Beck culminated their picturesque romance of 1877 at Port Townsend, where the marriage was performed. Mr. and Mrs. De Beck are both affiliated with the Sons and Daughters of Canada, an influential pioneer organization composed of those descended from true pioneer stock. Mr. De Beck, who still has wide holdings in Canada, is a retired lumberman. He also figures prominently in the Canadian mining industry. Mr. and Mrs. De Beck are the parents of five children, all but two of whom live in their native province. They have thirteen grandchildren, four of whom are Dorothy, Tommy, Roderick and Nancy Patricia Livesley of Salem. Beethoven Week in the United States is Set For March 20-26

The Salem MacDowell club will sponsor the local program which will commemorate the 100th anniversary of the death of Beethoven, the famous musician. The program will take place a week from tomorrow night in Waller Hall. A group of particularly talented Salem musicians have been engaged for the evening. Miss Frances Virginia Melton, head of the piano and theory departments at Willamette University, will give the centennial talk. Iva Clare Love and Helen Selig O'Neil, violinists, will give solos and duets. Miss Eugenia Savage, pianist, will give instrumental solos. Miss Lena Belle Tartar, head of the music department at the Salem high school, contralto, will sing. Miss Lucile Rod and Miss Dorothy Peetree, pianists, will give two-piano numbers.

Beethoven week, March 20-26, 1927, will be a nation-wide project with George Eastman of Rochester, N. P., as chairman, to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the death of Beethoven, through the performance of his masterworks against a background of community expression with the participation of schools, colleges, clubs, and civic agencies. This project will supplement the tributes to be paid by orchestras and choral societies and will utilize all available means for bringing Beethoven's message within reach of the widest audiences with the aid of the radio, the moving picture and the phonograph—the three modern instruments for mass appreciation which are the outstanding developments since the death of Beethoven. The program of Beethoven week is under the sponsorship of the Columbia Phonograph company which will make available to the schools and civic organizations recordings of the major works of Beethoven. The features of the program for Beethoven week, which are now being developed, include: Radio programs presenting "Fidelio," the only opera Beethoven wrote, and orchestral pieces, together with educational talks on the master. Moving pictures of the life of Beethoven.

The creation of an American composer of a special orchestral piece, in honor of the Beethoven centennial, and a series of educational talks by distinguished authorities. To carry out this program on a national scale, there are being organized sub-committees of the advisory body throughout the country, comprising the civic and artistic forces of each community participating.
