## French Tennis Aces Have Easy Time in Indoor Meet

NEW YORK, Mar. 21.—(AP)—Jean Borotra and Jacques Brugnon, French Davis cup stars, stroked off straight set victories in two rounds of national indoor tennis title play today while their American opposition was thinning under a grueling pace.

Neither of the tri-color contenders was pressed. Borotra did not feel called on to make his customary assaults at the net to turn back a New York veteran, R. E. Roberts, 6-1, 6-5 and a Japanese foe, S. Onda, 6-3, 6-2.

Brugnon won with almost parallel ease on an adjoining court. Putting out youthful Ferdinand Geller of New York in the first round, 6-0, 6-0, he pushed on under slightly stiffer opposition from P. G. Rockefeller, former Colgate athlete, 7-5, 6-1.
