

CHINESE SECTIONS CLOSELY GUARDED

Tong Truce Broken; Shooting in Eastern Cities; Cause Not Known

NEW YORK, March 24.—(AP.)—Chinese sections in cities from the Atlantic to the Pacific were under heavy police guard today after an outbreak of a tong warfare that took at least six lives and wounded others.

A barrage of bullets felled the members of On Leong and Hip Sing tongs in Brooklyn, Newark, N. J., Chicago, Manchester, Conn., Pittsburgh and Cleveland within the space of a few hours, smashing a truce that has been more or less in force for the past two years.

True to the secretive Oriental character, the fighting Chinese failed to confide the cause of their difficulties, but it was generally agreed the warfare bore no relation to the hostilities in China.

While disdaining to take the white man into their confidence as to the cause of the war, leaders of the tongs in New York appealed to an accidental to attempt to make peace between them. He was Michael J. Collins, United States treasury agent, who has worked in New York's Chinatown for 19 years. He said he would attempt to force an immediate settlement.

In the winding streets of the New York Chinatown those who ventured forth today rubbed elbows with a policeman every 50 feet. Ten new police posts were established.

Similar conditions exist in other cities.

The old deadline between the two warring tongs in Peel street, scene of many a battle between highlanders and hatchmen, was established again. Death is the penalty for any tong man who crosses the line into enemy territory.

SENATOR BINGHAM LIKES ADVENTURE

Has Explored South America and Earned Pilot's Wings in World War

WASHINGTON.—(AP)—Perhaps Senator Hiram Bingham was seeking adventure when he successfully entered the race for one of Connecticut's seats in the senate. At any rate, the pursuit of the unusual has occupied a large part of his life, making his career one of the most colorful disclosed on the senate roster.

Three times he has engaged in explorations in South America, and during the World War he vied with men much younger than himself to win an aviation pilot's wings in the army. He advanced so rapidly that soon he was in command of all military aeronautics schools in this country, and later was sent to France to take charge of the Issoudun flying field, the allies' largest air center.

In November, 1924, he was elected Governor of Connecticut. In the next month, he was chosen to succeed the late Senator Brandegee in a special election, and served as Governor only two days, long enough to be inaugurated, January 7, and to resign, January 8, November 2, 1926.

As professor of Latin-American history at Yale from 1907 to 1924, he explored the Spanish trade route from Buenos Aires to Lima. He then found Uliticos, the last Inca capital, in Peru, and explored the ruins of the Incas' wonder city of Machu Picchu, discovering the place where those two staples of modern diet, the Irish potato and Indian corn, originated. Prior to his Yale professorship, he explored Bolivar's route across Venezuela and Columbia.

PROBE CAUSE OF DEATH

Dr. Houck Not to Be Taken East Until Autopsy Completed

WASHINGTON, March 24.—(AP)—Police turned to physicians today to determine whether Mrs. Gladys Houck, wife of a former psychiatrist of the St. Elizabeth's hospital here, was murdered or committed suicide.

After a preliminary autopsy indicated that she met death by drowning, the authorities ordered a pathological examination of the tissues of her body which was found floating yesterday in a branch of the Potomac river. She had been missing since December 15.

In the meantime the authorities have withdrawn their order to have Dr. Knute Houck, her husband, who was taken into custody at Albany, Or., returned here pending the results of the pathological autopsy.

Kalone Arrested in Act of Breaking in Shed

The first clue on the disappearance of carpenter tools from construction sheds in various parts of the city was picked up early Thursday morning, when Officer Wintersteen arrested Steve Kalone, laborer, in the act of breaking into the tool shed at the new Leslie junior high school.

Kalone had a sharpened two by four wedge and a jimmy which he was using when apprehended. Although he does not admit taking any of the equipment previously reported missing, the police department believe that they have the man wanted.

WINE FROM GRAPE JUICE UNLAWFUL

Judge Hands Down Ruling so Householders Must Be More Careful

NEW YORK, March 24.—(AP)—Householders who do not go down into the cellar and put something in grape juice to keep it from turning into wine are violators of the eighteenth amendment, according to a decision given in federal court by Judge Augustus N. Hand.

He granted an order confiscating ten barrels of grape juice which chemists said contained 13 per cent alcohol.

The ruling, attorneys said, affects the status of farmers who make their own cider and wine, which heretofore has been considered immune to seizure.

The wine seized belonged to Mrs. Josephine Malton, who said she'd done nothing but put grape juice in barrels in her cellar.

Her attorney, EH Rosenberg, argued that it was legal to prepare grape juice for home consumption and that confiscation was irregular unless it were proved that the wine was intoxicating in fact.

Quoting section 29, title 2, of the national prohibition act, Judge Hand read:

"The penalties provided in this act against the manufacture of liquor without a permit shall not apply to a person who manufactures non-intoxicating cider and fruit juices exclusively for use in his own home, but such cider and fruit juices shall not be sold or delivered except to persons who have permits to manufacture vinegar."

"I can hardly regard grape juice containing 13 per cent of alcohol as non-intoxicating.

"Possession of grape juice for home use which was non-intoxicating when manufactured by the possessor, becomes unlawful under the act whenever the liquor becomes intoxicating, whether through natural fermentation or otherwise."

Haynes Reappointed Enforcement Chief

More Power Than Ever Before Given Head of New Bureau

WASHINGTON, March 24.—(AP)—Roy A. Haynes of Ohio, again is to have active charge of prohibition enforcement. Effective April 1 he will be acting head of the new prohibition bureau.

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with wider powers than at any time since he was named prohibition commissioner in 1921.

He has held that post since, working under the direction of the internal revenue bureau, but for several years practically has been a figure head.

With legislation passed in the closing days of the last congress, providing for a prohibition bureau—instead of a subordinate unit—Secretary Mellon today put Haynes in charge of it. At the same time he announced the appointment of Ernest W. Camp, director of the customs division, as the acting head of the customs bureau, which also will come into existence April 1.

Indications are that both will be retained as commissioners and that their permanent appointments will be announced after Secretary Mellon returns in April from a European trip on which he set out today.

Haynes, a target of wets in and out of congress ever since he came into national prominence, had the support of influential dry leaders as a candidate for prohibition commissioner. His appointment came after extended deliberation by Secretary Mellon and a conference with President Coolidge.
