

## SIDE LIGHTS OF THE STAGE and SCREEN

**Elsinore Theater**  
To be exact, Douglas MacLean brings a little more than a mile of smiles to the Elsinore theater today with his latest Paramount laugh provoker, "Let It Rain." You see, there are usually one thousand feet of film in a reel and five or six reels combine to make a feature picture. Any bright child will tell you the number of feet in a mile and, as Doug claims a smile for every foot, well, figure it out yourself!

"Let-It-Rain" Riley, leader of the marines on a battleship, is sentenced by his commander to shake hands with Kelley, a gob, every time they meet. While this sounds like a mild punishment for some of the battles they've fought it really has its disadvantages. For instance, both men fall in love with the same girl. One day they go ashore but Riley gets there first and takes her to an amusement park. He tells the lady of his love and they are about to go into a fond embrace when the nemesis comes along and insists on shaking hands for fifteen long minutes.

Fun! And how! But in addition to laughs of this sort, "Let It Rain" has an honest-to-goodness story. We see a new phase of marine duty the guarding of the mails. In fact, none of the picture's funniest and most exciting episodes take place on a runaway mail train the sole occupants of which are "Let-It-Rain" a wounded buddy, his girl and three bandits!

"Camera-mad" animals stealing the scene is not uncommon in the movies, as George Fitzmaurice, director of "The Night of Love," for Samuel Goldwyn, discovered after an hour of fruitless effort at dis-

susion. This time it was a California seal, lacking previous screen test and experience, but with a flair for film fame.

For some of the colorful gypsy sequences in "The Night of Love" showing at the Oregon theater, "Fitz" and the Goldwyn company, including Vilma Banky and Ronald Colman, the co-featured players, "moved" for the day to an ideal spot at Laguna Beach, California. The cameras were placed in position to best "catch" the sparkling waves as they rolled over rocks and beach, the company started to work, and "shooting" commenced.

But there was one serious drawback as the camera cranked. A mischievous seal playing among the rocks and in the water refused to vacate the scene. Wherever the cameras moved, the seal moved also—and always within range of the lens.

"Fitz" stroked his forehead and puzzled. In feudal Spain of 500 years ago, where the story of "The Night of Love" is laid, they didn't have California seals as talented as this one proved to be.

So the director called a "recess" and the Goldwyn company moved a sufficient distance to preclude the seal's following, and the work of the day proceeded, after a loss of time representing exactly \$485.

**NATION ENTERED WAR JUST 10 YEARS AGO**  
(Continued from page 1.)

The new congress—the sixty-fifth—assembled in Washington on April 1, and on the following night amid a driving rain, the president drove to the capitol to deliver his message in person to a joint session of the house and senate.

To and from the capitol the chief executive was greeted with applause. When he returned to the White House he remarked upon that and the fact that the people had been applauding his message which would mean death to many young Americans. And then then the pent-up emotions of the president had their way, and his intimates later related he sobbed like a child.

Already congress was moving to carry out the recommendation so dramatically made to it. War resolutions were introduced in the two houses, in the senate by Thomas S. Martin of Virginia, the democratic leader; in the house by Hen-

ry D. Flood, also of Virginia, chairman of the foreign affairs committee.

Days and nights of bitter debate followed, with Robert M. La Follette of Wisconsin, leading the opposition in the senate, and Claude Kitchen of North Carolina, the democratic leader, making an intensely dramatic speech in the house in opposition to the course of his president. Crowded galleries followed the course of the resolutions in both houses. The senate was the first to act, the resolution being approved, 82 to 6, late on the night of April 14.

Meeting at 10 a. m. exactly ten years ago, the house remained in session until 3 a. m. the next

morning before the resolution was approved 373 to 50.

The principals in this drama that preceded the greater one enacted by millions of Americans thrown across the seas, Wilson, Martin, Flood, La Follette and Kitchen, are now dead.
