Mr. Dancy therefore requests that anyone contemplating blasting, house-moving, tree falling, or any other activity of that nature in proximity to telephone wires, call the wire chief at Salem at the expense of the Telephone company. The wire chief will immediately cooperate in seeing that the work is performed successfully without danger to the wires.


