Matchmakers in larger cities are constantly on La Cruz's trail, seeking to sign him for bouts, and one which he will have soon will be against Eddie Schwartz in Portland.

The other bouts on tonight's card find some of the local favorites well matched, and some new faces for variety. Especial interest will be attached to the main event for the reason that the winner is scheduled to meet Phil Bayes, local bantam, on the next card.

COLISEUM, CHICAGO, April 12.—(AP)—Dave Shade, San Francisco middleweight won the verdict of the two judges and referee over Phil Krug of Patterson, N. J., in ten round bouts at the Coliseum tonight. Krug fought a defensive contest and was in full retreat most of the time with Shade trying to do the leading. Neither opened up except for a brief flash and the customers began filling out of the building as early as the sixth round.

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Senators Hold Coast League Club to 5-4 Score in Fast Contest

BALL PLAYED HERE SEEN NOT SO SLOW

Proving that the brand of baseball played in the Portland City league is not so far behind that which prevails at Pacific Coast league parks, the Salem Senators Tuesday afternoon held the hustling Portland Beavers to a one run victory, 5 to 4.

Fans who went out to Oxford park yesterday that the Senators would be able to chuck up 27 putouts before dark, and those who openly and ungrammatically opined that "Salem's got a rotten team this year," had little to say after the third inning, when the locals took the lead with the first two runs of the game; and they had still less to remark when the Senators were leading 4 to 1 at the opening of the seventh.

It was the stellar pitching of Wayne Barham, whom the fans didn't like at all Sunday, that held the Beavers to a few scattered hits and a single run for five innings; and it was the flashing bats of "Spec" Burke, "Bill" Steers, "Red" Ridings and Jack Bliss that put the Senators in the lead.

It's a fact that the Beavers appeared to hit and throw baseball a good bit faster and in a more businesslike fashion than most players seen in these parts, but the Senators made up in light for the visitors' advantage of daily competition, and it was a battle all the way.

Barham started out by whiffing the genial Edward Charles Tomlin, snake charming pitcher who played right field yesterday. Metz hit a long single and Prothro flied out to Burke. Smith singled but was caught trying to stretch it when the ball came in to the plate to hold Metz on third.

The Senators started swatting the offerings of French, once of Albany, in the first inning. Burke singled and Steers poked one over the right field wall for two bases, but both died on the sacks. Three Beavers grounded out in the second and McCurdy, who had doubled, failed to reach the plate. Two Senators also reached the paths, but French had struck out two of them and Barham, who had singled, was forced out at second on Sullivan's grounder.

Only three Beavers faced Barham in the third, and then came the Senators' scores. Bishop grounded out to third. Burke hit a two bagger and Steers singled, scoring Burke, and going to second on the throw in. Coleman doubled over the fence, scoring Steers.

The Senators' runs in the fifth were also earned, although they were made after two were out. Metz, the first man up, hit a two bagger over the fence, and after McCurdy and Cissell had been retired, Fischer doubled and Storti and Tomlin singled. Strand, Fischer and Storti crossed the plate.

Meanwhile in the half of the fifth, the class AA team had scored when McCurdy singled, advanced to third on two infield outs and scored on a wild pitch. After Fleury had relieved Barham at the opening of the sixth, the Beavers got three more in the seventh and tied the score. These runs also were made after two were out. Strand, the first man up, hit a two bagger over the fence, and after McCurdy and Cissell had been retired, Fischer doubled and Storti and Tomlin singled. Strand, Fischer and Storti crossed the plate.

In the eighth the Beavers broke the tie when Gissell hit a three-bagger and Fischer doubled.

Besides handling 20 chances with only one error, the Senators completed three neat double plays. The game was witnessed over a thousand people, a slightly smaller crowd than that of opening day.

OPENING CROWDS NEAR HIGH MARK

NEW YORK, April 12.—(AP)—Despite the postponement of the St. Louis-Detroit game because of rain, the outpouring of fans for today's major league opening contests exceeded the inaugural attendance for the 1926, and came within 6,000 of the high mark for the past five years.

The turnstiles registered a total of 227,660 spectators for the seven initial battles, as compared with last year's figure of 214,000 for eight games and the record mark of 233,000 set in 1925.

The three games in the American league outdrew the four games played in the National because of the tremendous gathering of 42,000 that saw the Athletics pry off the lid against New York at the Yankee stadium. The National league's largest crowd, 45,000, saw the world's champion Cardinals lose to the Cubs at Chicago. A record turnout of 34,758 saw the Pirates beat the Reds at Cincinnati.

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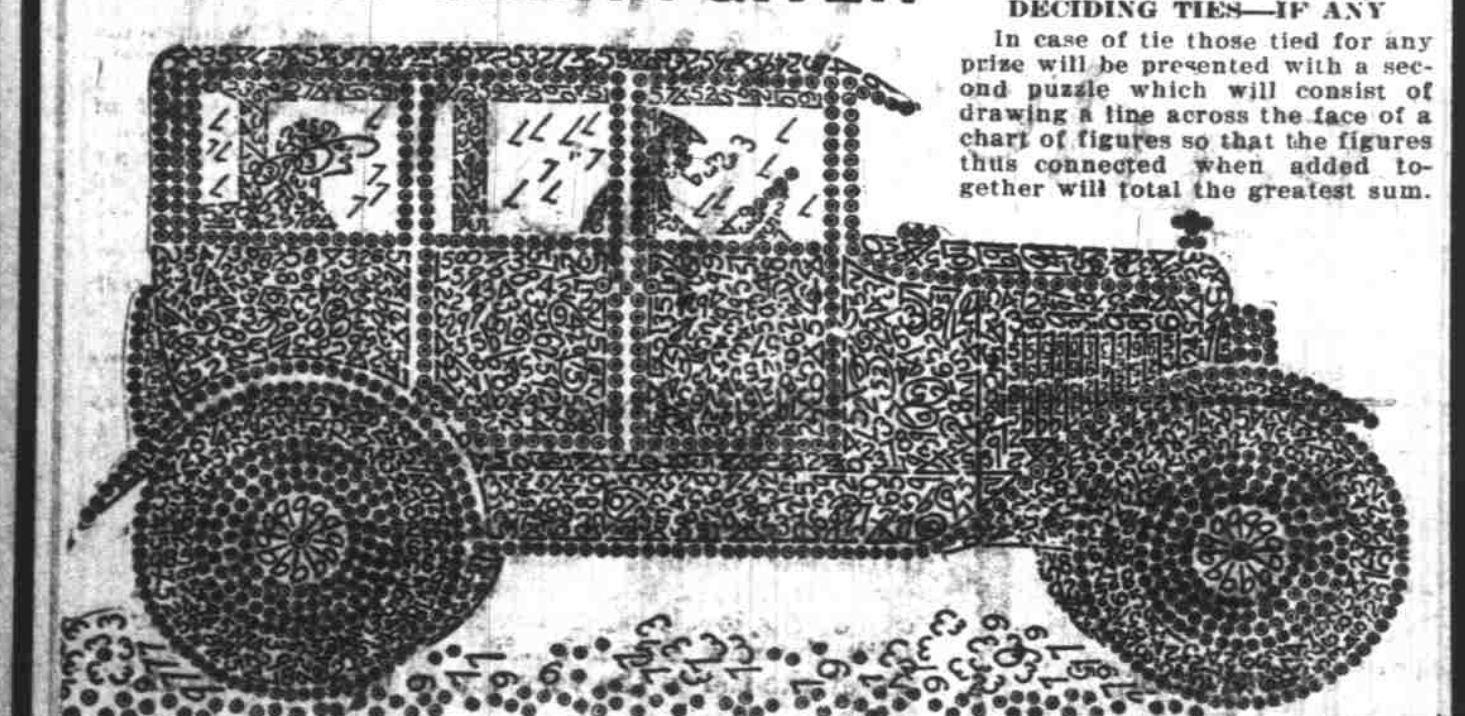

Add the figures to get the miles and count the circles to get the hours. No trick or chance involved. Only patience and accuracy required in the solution of this problem. If you can do simple addition, you can figure out the amount of miles traveled by this automobile, and how many hours, correctly. Circle spots consist of a period with a circle around it. Combined they are counted as one each; that is, count each period with its encompassing circle as one hour. Simply add them up to get the solution.

There are no marks, lines or characters in the automobile except figures and circle spots. The figures range from 2 to 9 each standing alone. There are no groups of figures such as "23" or "42." The heads of the 9's are distinctly curved while the tails of the 9's are straight or practically so. No trick or chance involved.

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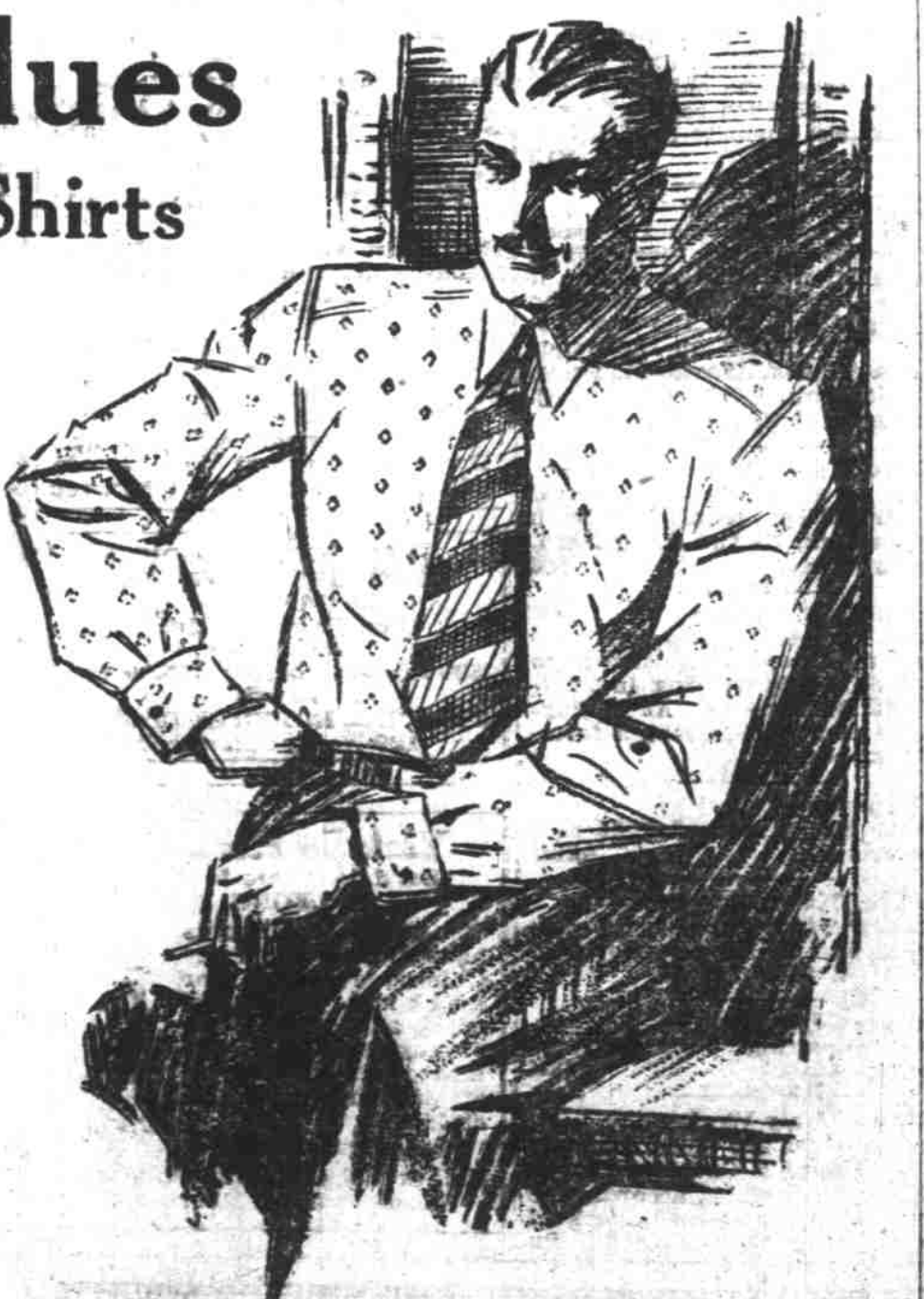
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
