

MESSALINA COMING TO CAPITOL THEATER

Scene of Play in 12 A. D. at Time Roman Empire at Highest Point

"Messalina" will be staged at the Capitol theater on Thursday, April 14, at 4:15 p. m. under the auspices of the Latin club. The scene is laid in the year 12 A. D., at the time when the Roman empire was at its height.

The settings of "Messalina" are exact reproductions of many famous Roman buildings. The circus maxims, which had a capacity for 500,000 spectators, the rostrum, the forum, the temple of Castor and Julia's basilic, were all reproduced of cement and plaster. They were so well made that the minister of public instruction in Italy required that all pupils view these settings in order to obtain the grandeur of the Roman empire.

Twelve thousand persons take part in the big scenes. The big feature being an accurate reproduction of the ancient chariot racing festivals of Rome. This race ends when two chariots crash together, throwing the drivers under the heels of the prancing horses.

Countess de Lignoro, who plays the title role, has long been heralded as the most beautiful woman of present-day nobility and an actress of equal ability. The support is made up of well known players.

UNEXPECTED DEATH OF HATTIE JACKSON

The End Came at 9:30 Last Night, After a Very Short Illness

Mrs. Hattie Jackson died at 9:30 last night at her late home at 406 North High street. Her fatal illness came on at 2 o'clock in the afternoon of yesterday, with a great pain in her head, which soon rendered her unconscious. Her age was about 78. She was born on Howell prairie, and lived all her life near this city or in Salem. She was a considerable property owner; renting several houses.

She served under Judge Bushey for several years as county juvenile officer and looking after the

dependents of Marion county. She was one of the best known women of the county. She was a member of the First Presbyterian church of this city. She was actively in charge of her business and going about her duties up to the afternoon of yesterday.

Her husband, T. B. Jackson, carpenter and contractor, died September 16, 1919.

Her only daughter (Maud) is Mrs. C. A. Pague of Portland, her husband agent of the Acacia life insurance society (Masonic). The funeral arrangements had not been made last night.
