pressed the opinion that the action would be decided on a demurrer to the state's complaint.

Attorney General VanWinkle said that while he had not determined definitely the nature of the action he would file the papers were being prepared and probably would be completed next week. It was indicated that he would file either a mandamus proceeding or an action at law.

Filing of the suit will follow the recent demand by the secretary of state that Marion county pay over to the state approximately \$24,000 of \$111,000 which was the county's share of the tax refund.

District Attorney Cordon said he would arrive in Salem within the next few days to confer with his associate counsel with relation to the proposed suit.

The Oregon and California land grant tax refund was authorized under an act of congress signed by the president in April, 1926. The refund was based on the amount of money the 18 counties would have received in taxes on the lands had they not have reverted to the federal government. The refund aggregated approximately \$4,000,000.
