## Fishing Vessel Sinks, Crew Members-Escape

JUNEAU, Alaska, April 15.—(AP)—Eight men narrowly escaped death near here today when the halibut vessel Majestic struck a rock in a blinding snowstorm and sank.

Captain C. J. Peterson, better known as Peter Kalooagan, was master of the boat, which also carried Karl Abrahamson, its owner and six fishermen. Gus Olsen, John Johnson, Neils Stanwick, Lawrence Knutson, Fred Hanson and John Bogen. The men swam several hundred yards through the choppy sea to the north shore of Douglas island.

## CEREMONIES HELD BY SUPREME COURT

### Thomas A. McBride Reviews Briefly Founding of Judicial Systems

Members of the state supreme court yesterday held appropriate ceremonies in commemoration of the selection of Dr. I. L. Babcock as the first supreme judge in Oregon. The selection was made at a meeting of settlers at Champoege February 18, 1841.

The first order written by Judge Babcock was under date of April 15, 1841, when he appointed David Leslie administrator of the estate of Ewing Young. Mr. Young had lived six miles west of Newberg for a number of years and had amassed a comfortable fortune. There was no law at the time of his death under which an estate could be administered.

Thomas A. McBride, senior member of the state supreme court and a native of Oregon, reviewed briefly the founding of Oregon's judicial system. He referred to Justice Babcock and a number of other early day members of the supreme court. Among these was an uncle of George H. Burnett, who is now serving as chief justice of the Oregon supreme court.

Following the ceremonies held in the supreme court chamber the members of the court left by automobile for Champoege where they passed the afternoon. Brief ceremonies were held at Champoege under the direction of Albert Tozler, one of Oregon's foremost historians.

## Switzerland Apologizes for Slaying of Russian

MOSCOW, Russia, April 15.—(AP)—The soviet foreign office tonight announced the signing of an agreement today at Berlin adjusting the long-standing controversy between soviet Russia and Switzerland over the assassination of Vaslav Vorovsky, soviet representative at the Lausanne conference in 1923.

The announcement said that Switzerland had expressed regret for the assassination of Vorovsky by Maurice Conradi, a Swiss engineer who later was acquitted, and for the wounding of Harman Ahrens, Russian press representative and companion of Vorovsky at the time of the assassination.

The agreement, the foreign office announcement added, provided for monetary compensation of the family of the slain soviet representative.
