department. Figures prepared by the secretary of state indicated that the rentals now paid for housing these departments outside of the capitol buildings will go a long way toward paying interest on the cost of the new structure.

Under the plan adopted by the legislature the money necessary to erect the new office building will be borrowed from the state industrial accident commission. Interest on the money will be paid by the state at the rate of 4 1/2 per cent. It has been said by the state treasurer and other state officials that the rentals to be assessed against the state departments occupying quarters in the new building would take care of the interest on the investment and eventually retire the principal. In this way the structure will be built without cost to the taxpayers.

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week indicated that steps are now being taken by certain employers who contribute to the industrial accident fund to initiate legal proceedings to determine whether the state has authority under the existing laws to obligate itself in excess of \$50,000. State officials said this question was determined by the courts a number of years ago when a suit was launched to enjoin a county from contracting a debt in excess of \$5000. The courts held in this case that the county had authority to contract the obligation for the reason that it was warranted by law. It was said that this decision of the courts would apply in the proceeding which it is proposed to file.

At the next session of the legislature a bill probably will be introduced by the state board of control authorizing the purchase of property and erection of a building to house the state printing department. The state printer now occupies half of the lower floor of the supreme court structure. It was said that a building adequate for the needs of the state printing department could be erected for \$50,000. This would release considerable floor space in the supreme court building, and at the same time improve the facilities of the printing department.

The plans for the new office building are being prepared by Knight & Howell, Portland architects. A large number of contractors were said to be interested in the new structure, and many bids probably will be received when the time for advertising expires.

No Labor Shortage—
That there is no labor shortage in Salem is indicated in the report issued by the United States employment service office here this week. For women, the office had

19 jobs to offer 23 applicants. Eight women wanted work as agricultural laborers and five were placed. Eight wanted work as cooks with two placed; five as kitchen workers, one placed; nine hotel workers (two placed; three as waitresses, none placed. Male employment figures show 217 wanted work and only 127 placed. Agricultural work was wanted by 102 and 71 were placed. Nine carpenters applied and two were placed; sixty common laborers sought jobs with but 23 jobs available; 22 woods laborers had but 11 jobs; and six auto truck drivers and two teamsters applied, with no jobs available.
