Insurance Companies Top List in State According to Report

Insurance companies licensed to operate in Oregon had aggregate investments of \$102,731;-559.34 in the state on December 31, 1926, according to a statement prepared by the state insurance commissioner. On December 31, 1925 these investments totalled \$86,364,851.32.

The investments on December. 31 of last year included mortgage loans on city and farm property of \$52,925,827.68, state, school, road, municipal and miscellaneous bonds \$24,359,469.28, interurban street railway and railroad bonds - \$23,789,502.75 and real estate \$1,656,759.63.

Life insurance companies topped the list with relation to aggregate investments. The investments of these companies totalled \$86,727,092.33. Included in these investments were mortgage loans on city and farm property \$51,713,662.95, state, school, road, municipal and miscallaneous in Christ. bonds \$15,485,448.16, interurban. street railroad and railroad bonds \$18,853,996,50 and real estate \$673,984.72.

Investments of the fire insurance companies aggregated \$7,-443,974.24, segregated as fol-




