

Mary K. Browne Declared Ineligible To Compete As Amateur Golfer

WESTERN OFFICIALS MAY IGNORE RULING

NEW YORK, April 20.—(AP.)—Mary K. Browne, for 15 years a conspicuous figure in American sports, today was declared ineligible to compete as an amateur golfer.

After a day and a half of deliberation the executive committee of the United States Golf Association late this afternoon handed down a ruling that the former California star of court and links had "acted in a manner detrimental to the best interests of golf" in turning professional as a tennis player last winter.

The decision, officials said, would bar her from all amateur tournament competition in this country as a golfer. While the verdict of the committee applies particularly to championship contests, it will also be active among the sectional associations governed by the parent body. The bars thus have been raised against the only fair player in the nation who achieved the amazing record of reaching national title finals in both tennis and golf.

Although ten committeemen came to the meeting yesterday with a pronounced division of opinion prevailing, the opposition to future acceptance of Miss Browne as an amateur proved sufficiently strong to bring about a unanimous vote on the following resolution:

"Resolved, that by reason of the manner in which Miss Mary K. Browne has capitalized her skill in amateur athletics, in the opinion of the executive committee she has acted in a manner detrimental to the best interests and true spirit of the game of golf, and she is, therefore, declared ineligible to compete in any amateur tournament under the jurisdiction of this association."

Miss Browne's case, unique in the history of the organization, was not specifically covered in the rules defining professionalism. Neither is it covered in the regulations governing applications for reinstatement. The association often has restored to amateur standing players who turned professional, however, one outstanding star being the present national amateur champion, George Von Elm.

The rules provide that "any applicant for reinstatement must have acted so as to come within the definition of an amateur golfer for a period of three consecutive years immediately preceding the date of application."

CHICAGO, April 20.—(AP.)—Mary K. Browne is eligible to play in the amateur tournaments for women held by clubs of the western golf association, which is composed of more than 400 golf clubs and has the largest active membership of any golf organization, despite the declaration of the U. S. Golf Association that she is no longer an amateur.

President Hobart P. Young of the W. G. A. tonight said that unless his organization acted formally to bar Miss Browne, she could play in all W. G. A. tournaments for women.
