

### EXCLUSION CLAUSE MEETS OBJECTIONS

Letters Mailed to Teachers of City; Dr. Brown Declined to Comment

Salem teachers this week have been receiving from the Oregon Osteopathic association letters of protest against a statement in the children's health record instructions that osteopaths and chiropractors are not recognized by the medical profession, and should not be used to certify the health records.

The letters read as follows: (1) The State Board of Medical Examiners is composed of five medical physicians and one osteopathic physician. The osteopathic physician is president of the examining board. As a result of this recognition, every medical doctor who has been licensed in the state of Oregon in the last 10 years has taken 20 per cent of his examinations under an osteopathic physician and his license to practice has been signed by this osteopathic physician.

(2) The osteopathic physicians of this state have all the legal rights that the medical physicians have, such as signing of all legal documents, birth and death certificates—holding public health offices, etc.

(3) Our education training is the equal of medical training. Statements like the one referred to above are therefore made either through ignorance or as a deliberate attempt to belittle osteopathic physicians. Many families in Salem, for years have no one but an osteopathic physician as their family physician.

Dr. Walter H. Brown, director of the child health demonstration, declined last night to comment on the protest. The forms including the objectionable statement were drawn up by the demonstration heads.

they hung half out of the windows in an attempt to reach the ground.

Some Passengers Escape

First reports reaching Mexico City said that all the passengers had been killed, but President

Calles later received information that about half of them had escaped. The presidential office also received reports that three or four Catholic priests had led the attacking party, characterized by the government as rebels, numbering a little more than 200.

The railroad authorities were of the belief that the train carried from 100 to 200 passengers and their estimates were that between 100 and 160 persons were killed or injured.

Former President Obregon's daughter, Coquita, who is the wife of an army officer, Colonel Ponce Leon, is reported among the dead or injured. No Americans are known to have been on the train.

**Believed Revolutionists**  
There is a belief current in Mexico City that the outrage was the work of revolutionists, as was the case in the recent attack on a Laredo-Mexico City train to discredit the Calles administration as much as possible, both at home and abroad, and focusing foreign attention on the revolutionary conditions in Mexico.

Relief train and troops have been rushed to the scene of the holdup and the survivors have been taken to Irapuato.

### VISITORS EXPECTED AT ANNUAL MEETINGS

Local Committee Making Plans for Entertainment During Encampment

From 1200 to 1500 visitors will come to Salem June 21 and remain here several days to attend the annual state encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic and affiliated bodies, according to the announcement of Charles Fessenden, chairman of the committee on arrangements.

This visitors will include not only members of the GAR who served during the Civil war, which ended 62 years ago at Appomattox, but also members of the Ladies of the GAR, Women's Relief Corps, Sons and Daughters of Veterans and Spanish War Veterans and auxiliary bodies.

Special efforts will be made to entertain members of the GAR and affiliated bodies. This will perhaps include a barbecue and program at the state fair grounds, in addition to other entertainment.

To secure funds to properly entertain the veterans, a committee has been appointed. This committee will be in charge of D. G. Drager and Walter L. Stolz, who will solicit during the next few days.

The entertainment and care given the visitors will depend largely upon the generosity with which the committee in charge of securing funds is received. As it is 62 years or more since the veterans served and as the ranks of the GAR is rapidly growing smaller, the annual encampment this year is perhaps the last encampment that will be attended by many of the old time veterans.

Hurling the levee at Clarendon, Ark., the White river early today surged through that town of 3000 inhabitants and changed its streets into whirling whirlpools where boats, men, animals and swaying houses were tossed about in disorder. Reports of loss of life to tardy residents of the lower sections went unconfirmed until relief agencies could explore the stricken town.

Driven by a break in the Arkansas river northwest of Little Rock, the flood charged down in a diminishing wall upon the town of Levy and moved on to widen the inundated area in north Little Rock, across the stream from the capital.

### Evacuate Town

NEW MADRID, Mo., April 20. (AP)—The evacuation of this Mississippi river town, seat of 67 New Madrid county, in southeast Missouri, continued tonight with flood waters surrounding all buildings to a depth of from 5 to 15 feet.

More than half of the town's population of approximately 2000 had fled to Sikeston, Charleston and other nearby towns while the remaining citizens were marooned in upper stories, waiting for boats to take them away.

Mayor S. L. Hunter estimated late today about 800 persons remained in the flooded town but said all would leave as soon as possible. Water was more than 6 feet deep on the main street.

### SEIZURE HELD ILLEGAL

Officers and Crew of Federalship Released by Court Order

SAN FRANCISCO, April 20. (AP)—Captain S. S. Stone, skipper of the liquor ship, Federalship, and 19 members of his crew, were released from the county jail here today after the federal district court ruled that seizure last month of the vessel, its million-dollar rum cargo and crew by the United States government was illegal.

The court did not, however, direct the release of the ship and its \$1,000,000 cargo, and Henry E. Farmer, assistant collector of customs, refused to surrender the vessel on demand of defense attorneys.

The United States attorney refused to issue an order of release until he had received word from the attorney general's office, to which he telegraphed the decision
