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PIONEER DIES IN FALLS CITY HOME

Came From England Around Horn Bringing First Piano to This Valley

FALLS CITY, Or., April 21.—(Special)—Mrs. Eleanor Field Butler was born Feb. 7, 1846, in Royston, Hertfordshire, England, and died April 17, 1927, at her home, "Hillcrest," Falls City, Or. She was married to Frank Butler April 27, 1871, living in Brantwood, Essex, England, until the year 1881, when she, her husband and two sons left England for the United States, coming to Corvallis.

In 1883 they came to Polk county, taking over the Scott and Sheldon donation land claims which they named Oakhurst Farm. In 1906 they moved to their home "Hillcrest" in the southern part of Falls City, where Mr. Butler died in 1908, and where Mrs. Butler had continued to make her home until her death.

Mr. and Mrs. Butler were the parents of four children, two of whom survive—Arthur R. Butler, a physician in the civil service department, Washington, D. C., and Randolph H. Butler, living on the Oakhurst farm where he was born. In addition there are five grandchildren and one great grandchild, besides other relatives remaining in England.

Eleanor Field Butler was a woman of rare charm, whose life was an inspiration. Her kindly friendliness and thoughtful consideration of others was shown in innumerable ways which endeared her to all. Early in childhood she became a communicant of the Church of England, and in Falls City was active in church work, being one of the organizers of the first church, a community church, which later affiliated with the Methodist Episcopal denomination. She was a member of this church and since 1891 had been one of its trustees.

Frank Butler was a civil engineer and surveyed and platted the town of Falls City, later plating Butler's addition, which he placed on the market. He donated the land for the Gerlinger railway, which later became the Salem, Falls City & Western, and is now a branch of the Southern Pacific.

When the Butler family first came to Falls City they came in by trail on horseback, journeying through dense woods, and were among the first to find and admire the beautiful falls in the Little Luckiamute river, from which the city received its name.

For years their log house home at Oakhurst was the mecca which

drew the neighbors from miles around, who came to sing, and to hear Mr. Butler play upon the massive grand piano of walnut, the first instrument of its kind here, being shipped in around the Horn, a six months' journey.

Funeral services were held on Wednesday afternoon in the Methodist Episcopal church, with interment in the Odd Fellows cemetery, beside her husband and son. The church was filled with friends who came to pay their last tribute by bringing great quantities of the beautiful flowers she loved so well to add beauty to the impressive service.

Problems of Growing to Be Discussed at Barber Ranch in Spring Valley

Barker place in Spring Valley for Friday afternoon of this week at 1:30 for the purpose of looking over Mr. Barker's planting of alfalfa and discussing the better methods of establishing a field of alfalfa with the farmers.

S. A. Barker and his son Roy have a very good field of alfalfa that was seeded last year and so strongly are they impressed with the chances and advantages of alfalfa that they are planning on seeding another acreage this year. Their neighbor, J. S. Hiatt, is planting an even larger acreage and likewise are many others.

There are certain facts concerning the establishment of a seedling of alfalfa that are pretty well known despite the newness of the crop and it is for the purpose of talking these over that Mr. Barker has called this meeting and it would be well for everyone interested in alfalfa culture to attend the meeting at the Barker place Friday afternoon.
