Most of the losers' points came in the distance events, where nine points were gathered in each the mile and half mile and five in the two mile run. Oregon excelled in the sprints and field events. Captain Proster Flanagan, and Victor Wetzel, both of Oregon, tied for high point distinction with 11 points each. "Happy Hank" Poon, Cougar hurdler, led his team with 10 points.
