And there is no boll weevil in flax, nor any other pest that cannot be completely controlled by rotation and proper cultural methods.

Every man in the southeastern section of Salem is expected to attend a meeting at the Richmond school, at eight tomorrow evening, to organize the Richmond Improvement club. # CABLE COMPLETED

New Span Increases Number of Circuits Between Portland and South

An important project which has been under way for the past two years involving a considerable improvement to the long distance telephone facilities between Portland and San Francisco met with completion with the finishing this week of work on the toll cable span over the Willamette river at Wilsonville, according to W. H. Dancy, manager of the Pacific Telphone & Telegraph company. This project increased the number of circuits available between the two cities from 10 to 12, and was attended with expense which ran into many thousands of dollars.

One of the principal problems that is met with in carrying telephone conversations over long disances, according to Mr. Dancy, by induction. 
