

# Knockout for Bayes or Decision for O'Brien, Prediction of Fans

## BEST ATTENDANCE OF YEAR FORECAST

Either Phil Bayes will knock out Tommy O'Brien, or the Portland boy will win by a decision—that is the general verdict of fans as they view the prospects for Wednesday night's main event at the armory, a battle that is attracting more interest than any fight of the many unusual drawing cards staged by Matchmaker Harry Plant this season.

Bayes will hold his final workout this evening at the armory, and in anticipation of a considerable crowd of interested fans, it has been arranged to have the fight in place. This will be a hot workout, and will include no boxing.

Both Bayes and O'Brien were reduced at the ball game Sunday, and they both drew a generous round of applause, but that Bayes was considerably more efficient than the hand given O'Brien, indicating that the fans are fully appreciative that Bayes is a Salem boy and deserving of their support.

The forecast is for a record crowd Wednesday night, but Matchmaker Plant assures the fans that there will be plenty of seats—the seating capacity of the armory is 2600 and arrangements have been made to provide that every seat, so everybody will be accommodated.

The fighters will weigh about 145 pounds each, but they will not weigh in, the contract this time being for catch weights. Billy Bop, sports editor of the Portland News, has been selected to referee the bouts.

With the exception of one preliminary, the card is complete. Ben Watts and Johnny Walker are signed up Monday for a four and preliminary. They are will-be mixers, and should furnish the entertainment.

The six round semi-final will be between Al Sharp of Salem and Jack Davis of Oregon City, who might a fast draw here recently. They will weigh about 135 each. The four round bout will find Pete Willert of Salem matched with "Kid" Hayes of Stayton, at 145 pounds.

Since there are no fights in Portland this week, a big crowd of Portland fans is coming to root for O'Brien in the main event, and has been informed.

There's no question about it, Sunday was an off day for the Salem Senators, pitchers and all; but that's not offered as an alibi; they would have had an awful time beating Mr. Scott even at their best, any time Lefty Schroeder used the "stuff" that he had in this game. So it's just as well, if they were due to lose anyway, that the Senators get a few bobbles and strikeouts out of their system.

The trouble started after one was out in the first inning, and came in bunches from then on. Harris singled, and Wolfer did likewise. Harris going to third, Tuma dumped one to the infield, and his Ump called Harris safe at the plate on a close decision.

Faust walked, and Wolfer scored on the wildest pitch that Wayne Barham ever heaved in his life. It missed the plate by eight feet. Then, after Barham had fanned Buono, Perkins hit a two bagger, scoring Tuma and Faust. The next two innings didn't go so bad, but in the fourth it became clearly evident that Barham's arm wasn't working right. Perkins and Goodwin singled successively, and Schroeder was safe when the ball bounced off Barham's glove. Perkins scored. Then Babarino hit a two bagger, and Goodwin and Schroeder romped home.

Russell went in to pitch and "reared" the side without any more scoring; but in the fifth the fat was in the fire again. Faust was safe on a bobble at first, and Buono sacrificed him along. Perkins singled and Goodwin walked, filling the bases. Schroeder struck out, but Gabarino walked, scoring Faust. Edwards threw wild to Russell in returning the ball after a pitch and Perkins scored.

Just before that, the Senators had gathered two runs when Steers singled and Goleman homered over the center field fence. It was the only bright spot in a day of gloom.

Mt. Scott gathered a run in the sixth on a two bagger by Wolfer, a single by Buono, a walk for Faust, filling the bases, and a sacrifice fly to deep center by Perkins; and one in the seventh when Schroeder skied a homer over the left field fence.

Russell retired when Laurie pinch hit for him in the seventh, and Fleury pitched the last two innings, holding the visitors scoreless.
