

KIMBALL FACULTY MEMBERS BUSY

They Undertake Much for the Common Good; Work for Summer Planned

As the faculty expense of the budget at Kimball School of Theology is by far the largest item, it is well for contributors toward the support of the school to know what these men may be doing out of school hours. It seems to the new president, Dr. John M. Canse, that there is no more conscientious group of men to be found anywhere. Nothing seems to be too much for the communities near by to ask that they do not readily undertake for the common good.

Professor C. I. Andrews spends most of his weekends directing schools of religious education throughout western Oregon. This week he is at Junction City. He has accepted the important position for the summer of director of religious education at the Gladstone chautauqua. Doctor E. S. Hammond, the pastor of the faculty, will visit the College of the Pacific, Stockton, Cal., and call on old friends enroute, spending some time with his son, who is a chemist at the navy headquarters, Mare Island.

Dean John D. McCormick will spend the summer with the Temple Tour, known as the Students' Travel Tour of Europe and the Holy Land. He has greatly desired to make this trip for several years as a special aid to his Bible courses at Kimball and Willamette university. His son, Kenneth, will accompany him. Much of the summer teaching he had expected to do will be taken over by Professor C. M. Keefer. With his special studies at Boston for a number of years, Prof. Keefer is well prepared to add many new methods and expressions that young people will eagerly accept. He will teach at the summer school of Kimball School, from June 15, lasting ten days. Then he will be on the faculty at the Epworth League Institutes at Falls City and at Ocean Park, Washington.

A Heavy Program
Professor W. H. Hertzog, whom so many men of Salem know for his athletic interests, last year devoted much of the summer to rural leadership among the churches and conferences in California. He is considered authority on matters regarding home missions and church extension. Most of his Sundays are taken among the churches of the Kim-

ball School student pastors. It is largely through his influence that many churches in nearby country towns have been awakened for more helpful community service along modern lines of a more practical character. President Canse expects to attend a dozen summer institutes and conferences in the interest of students and support of the several annual conferences within the territory of the seminary.

Those who reflect on this heavy program for the summer among the Kimball faculty will appreciate their ambitions in the interest of others and the better preparation they will have for next year's teaching. In former years much of the field work for funds has been done in the summer by these men. It would seem a good business venture to let them be freed from this detail and turn to the special work they have in mind for the summer. This will require a prompt response from the friends in sending in their contributions. This can easily save the expense of paid field workers and show the personal interest of the people of Oregon and the northwest in the welfare of Kimball School of Theology. The financial policy is to make the money go as far as possible, and President Canse and the trustees are relying on the interest of the people.

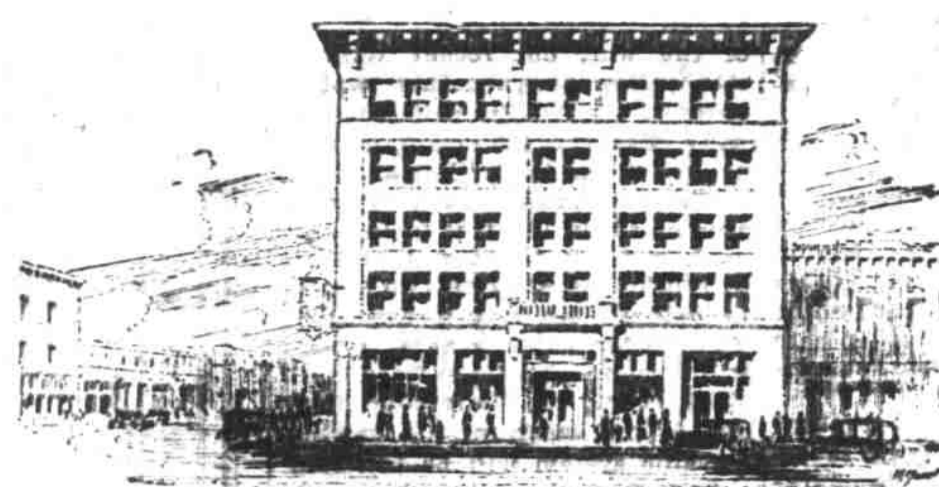
