## Education Problems Base Of Discussion

### Mental Segregation, Outside Activities Important Subjects

Four major problems in the educational profession will be investigated by various committees of the northwest association of secondary and higher education, according to Superintendent George W. Hug, who returned Sunday from Seattle where he attended meetings of that organization. Superintendent Hug is president of the association.

Segregation of pupils into classes according to ability; whether the courses offered in college are of practical value to the teachers in the profession; whether extra-curricular activities assumed by high school students are of sufficient value to counteract the time and energy expended on them; and how large a class teachers can handle without lowering efficiency are the problems which will be surveyed.

R. W. Tavener, assistant principal of the Salem high school, is one of a committee assigned to the investigation. Preliminary reports will be given at the National Educational association convention in Seattle next July.

tenced to be hanged November 5, 1926, but again the executions were delayed because of an appeal to the United States supreme court. Attorneys said that the decision of the United States supreme court today exhausted all legal maneuvers to save the men from the gallows.

Tom Murray, third member of the trio involved in the prison break, also was convicted of first-degree murder. He subsequently committed suicide in the prison.

Bert (Oregon) Jones, another convict who participated in the break and shooting, was killed as he attempted to scale the penitentiary wall.

At the time of the prison break Kelley and Willos were serving long terms for highway robbery.
