

Air Mail Service Helps Western Population Most

WASHINGTON-(AP)- Western states appear to find the government's airplane mail service of more value than eastern states do; In proportion to population, and in some cases as a matter of actual bulk, the western air mail carriers are exceeding the totals reported by the eastern routes.

Between Salt Lake and Los Angeles the air mail has carried 9,-500 pounds of letters and parcels in the best month since its establishment, and the aeronautics branch of the Commerce department figures that this amounted to 13:63 pounds of mail for each 1000 of population along the route. In the best month of the New York-Boston air service the volume was 2000 pounds, which was less than a third of a pound

per 1000 of population. On the Chicago-Dallas route the ratio was 2.40 pounds to each 1,-000 of population; Seattle-Los Angeles, 3.67; Cheyenne Pueblo, 7:70: Atlanta-Miami, 5.80: Detroit-Chicago and St. Louis-Chi-

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

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
