turned to the camp, he said, one of them told him that they had been compelled to shoot one man but gave no idea that they had shot more than one.

One of the twin DeAutremont brothers was drowned in Rogue river, Fredenberg told the sheriff, but he was not certain whether it was Ray or Roy. The other, he said, was in Honduras. Fredenberg was so familiar with the Siskiyon holdup that the sheriff believes his story worth investigating, but he also believes the man may be shamming for the purpose of being taken to Oregon to testify and thus escape trial here.
