

EX-CORPORAL GETS ONE ON MAGAZINE

Ex-Marine Looking for Some Former Buddies When Division Meets

WASHINGTON. (AP) — Jay Williams of Gettysburg, S. D., has been induced to "join up" again. Secretary of War and Assistant Secretary of War and Assistant Secretary of the Second Division Association.

Williams was a corporal in the Sixth Marines, attached to the Second Division during the war, while MacNider was progressing with that outfit to the rank of Lieutenant Colonel. They met during and after the war, and MacNider has a bulky file of correspondence as a result.

Getting ready for the Second Division reunion here June 4, MacNider signed 35,000 letters urging veterans eligible to membership to attach a dollar to an enclosed blank and add their names to the 5,000 on the association's roll.

The one addressed to Williams was the one reproduced on the outfit's publication, "The Indian Head," and Williams, after thinking it over for a week, replied:

"That's the first time I was ever dunned on the front page of a magazine; and I never thought in 1918, that any horse-riding officer would ever get me to join anything again. You win. Here's my dollar."

"I'm almost tempted to attend one of the reunions. Possibly I would have the good fortune to meet a certain dirty lout whom I have been waiting to meet for the past eight or nine years. If I ever meet him, all I want is some neutral by-standers and a little room to work in."

"There is also the dude who owes me 100 marks from a poker game in Rheinbrohl; and I might meet an old friend, a corporal who stole the best cuts of meat from the supplies of the officers' mess, and who always carried a little gold bar for his cap and a slicker to cover his uniform when he spent a late evening in the company of Corporal Goff and myself."
