NOON NAPS MAKE CO-EDS ALERTER

Only One School in Country Adopts Plan for Mid-Day Siesta

COLUMBIA, Mo., (AP) — A nap each noon is the newest in courses for co-eds.

The midday siesta, after a two-months trial at Stephens junior college for girls, has been adjudged such a success that it has been put into effect permanently.

President James M. Wood ordered its trial with a view to lessening the nervousness caused by long hours of study, freshening the minds of the young women for afternoon classes and improving the already excellent dispositions of his pupils.

After a month the girls agreed that the noon nap added to their alertness, gave them greater interest in afternoon classwork and soothed nervous temperaments. Only a handful found no benefit in the siesta.

Each noon when lunch is over the girls must go to their rooms. They may not study nor make any noise. Although they are not compelled to sleep, most of them do and the rest find some sort of relaxation.

President Wood does not know of any other school in the United States that has adopted such a device. He adopted it from the Spanish custom of a complimentary and physical rest at midday.

"Their relaxation hour is a splendid thing," he concludes, "for girls who live in such a whirl of work and social activity as is found in a college town."

"Most of the girls get enough physical exercise, but they need to learn to relax and to relieve the nervous tension that accompanies study and classroom work."

"The siesta breaks into the day and gives the girls mental and bodily reinforcement. Besides relieving nervousness it makes the girls free of excitement and less inclined to be flighty."
