### May Fire Loss \$485,394 Says State Fire Marshal

Fire losses in the state of Oregon, exclusive of Portland, for the month of May aggregated \$485,394, according to a report prepared here Friday by the state fire marshal. There were a total of 75 fires reported, of which three were of an incendiary origin. The most disastrous fire was at LaGrande where a fertilizer plant was destroyed with a loss of \$300,000.
