

PRACTICAL VALUE OF COURSES SEEN

Graduates of Salem High Machine Shop Course Get Recognition

Two graduates of the machine shop course offered by Salem high school were chosen recently by the General Electric and Western Electric companies as members of a group of twenty selected by those companies for special service in the electric field, according to the report of E. E. Bergman, head of the high school machine shop, to Superintendent George W. Hug recently.

Julian Burroughs, who later graduated from OAC, and Earnest Webb, who paid his way through college doing machine shop work, were the two chosen among a field of hundreds of applicants.

Other graduates who have gone immediately into work in shops have advanced rapidly because of the training received here. Graduates are located in shops in Dallas, Silverton, Portland, Salem, Seattle, and Tacoma, Wash., and San Francisco, Cal.

Thirty-six students have been enrolled in the course during the past year, taking three hours of work in the shop each day. This is the largest number in the history of the work here, but Mr. Bergman reports that he expects

an enrollment of 50 or 60 next year.

That the shop has proved to be a good financial investment is shown by the fact that applies for the year's work cost \$70.09, while the total credit for work done amounts to \$246.90, showing a net profit of \$176.81. Cash received from outside sources for work done was \$159.40, and the value of work done for the school was figured at \$86.50.

During the past nine years, said Mr. Bergman, the shop had produced an income of about \$6,000 in cash, which is enough to pay for all the equipment of the shop.

The manufacture of onion tapers for local growers has been the largest single source of revenue, Mr. Bergman reported.

The course offered has been approved by the federal board of vocational education, and also by the state director of trade and industrial education.

likelihood for Friday. Both the recent ocean hops have been week-end flights, Lindbergh having taken off on a Friday and Chamberlain and Levine on a Saturday.

A man close to the Byrd flying camp at Roosevelt field told the Associated Press this morning that Byrd intended to hop off tomorrow night or Thursday morning, with Lindbergh at the field to wish him luck, thus reversing their positions of four weeks earlier, and that the flight would be a return trip, with only a few hours stopover in Paris.
