DAIRY COW USEFUL

DISCOVERY OF VITAMINE PRINCIPLE IMPORTANT

"Our Debt to the Dairy Cow" was the subject of an address by J. D. Mickle, state dairy and food commissioner, before the Salem Rotary club Wednesday noon. In his discourse, Mickle related the interesting history of the discovery of the vitamins principle in dietetics, and traced its relation to the dairy industry. He quoted authorities who claimed that the discovery was one of the three outstanding achievements of the age, the others being radio and the Einstein theory of relativity. The vitamins principle has made it possible to combat the four scourges which their lack in modern diet had caused, Mickle said: beriberi, scurvy, rickets and pellagra; but that is possible only to the extent that people know and follow out the principle. The products of the humble cow, milk, cream and butter, prevent these diseases and are essential to growth and reproduction, Mickle emphasized.
