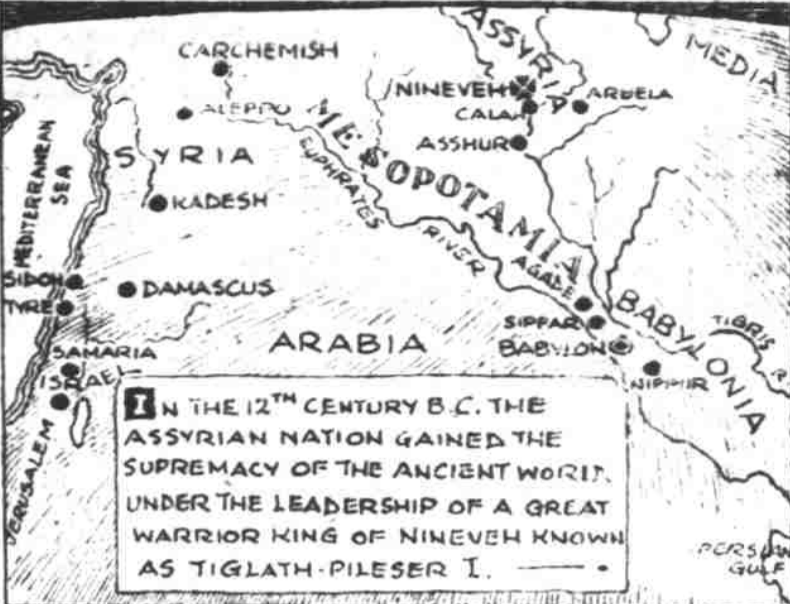


HIGH LIGHTS OF HISTORY

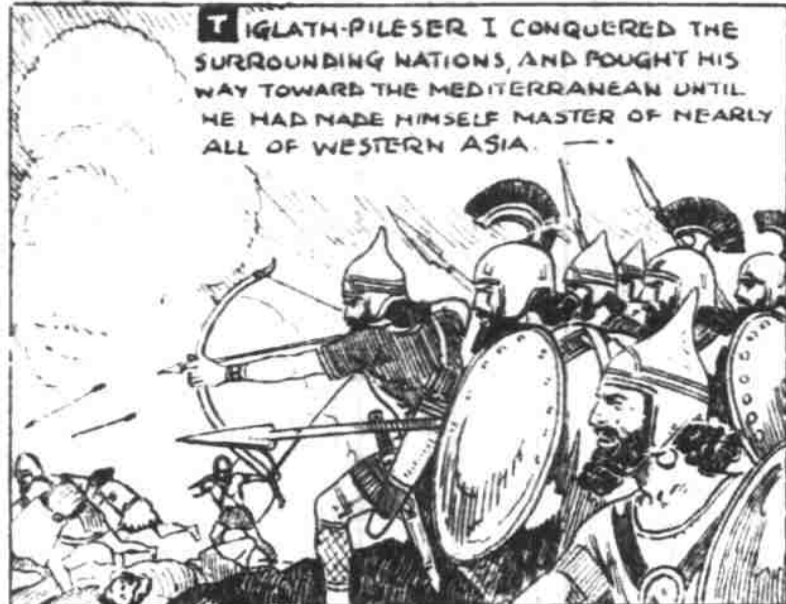


1 THE ASSYRIANS WERE THE MOST HATED AND FEARED NATION OF ANCIENT TIMES.

2 ORIGINALLY DESERT WANDERERS, THE ASSYRIANS, WHO WERE OF THE SAME RACE AS THE BABYLONIANS AND HEBREWS, SETTLED ON THE TIGRIS RIVER IN UPPER MESOPOTAMIA. THEY WERE A HARDY, VIGOROUS PEOPLE.

3 THE CITY OF ASSHUR WAS AT FIRST THEIR CENTER OF POWER AND THE SEAT OF WORSHIP OF THE GOD ASSHUR. BUT AFTER A TIME NINEVEH BECAME THE PERMANENT ASSYRIAN CAPITAL.

4 IN THE 12TH CENTURY B.C. THE ASSYRIAN NATION GAINED THE SUPREMACY OF THE ANCIENT WORLD, UNDER THE LEADERSHIP OF A GREAT WARRIOR KING OF NINEVEH KNOWN AS TIGLATH-PILESER I.



5 TIGLATH-PILESER I CONQUERED THE SURROUNDING NATIONS, AND FOUGHT HIS WAY TOWARD THE MEDITERRANEAN UNTIL HE HAD MADE HIMSELF MASTER OF NEARLY ALL OF WESTERN ASIA.

6 ASSUR-NAIR PAL, ANOTHER ASSYRIAN KING, WAS THE MOST CRUEL OF CONQUERORS. HE DESTROYED THE TEMPLES HE CAPTURED, LAID WASTE THE FIELDS, AND KILLED HIS CAPTIVES BY TORTURE.

7 TIGLATH-PILESER II HELD A FIRM GRASP ON THE LANDS HE CAPTURED, BY ORGANIZING THEM AS PROVINCES, EACH RULED BY AN ASSYRIAN GOVERNOR. HE MADE THE CONQUERED PEOPLE PAY HIM HEAVY TRIBUTE, AND SOMETIMES TO PREVENT THEM REVOLTING, HE SCATTERED THEM INTO DIFFERENT PARTS OF THE KINGDOM.

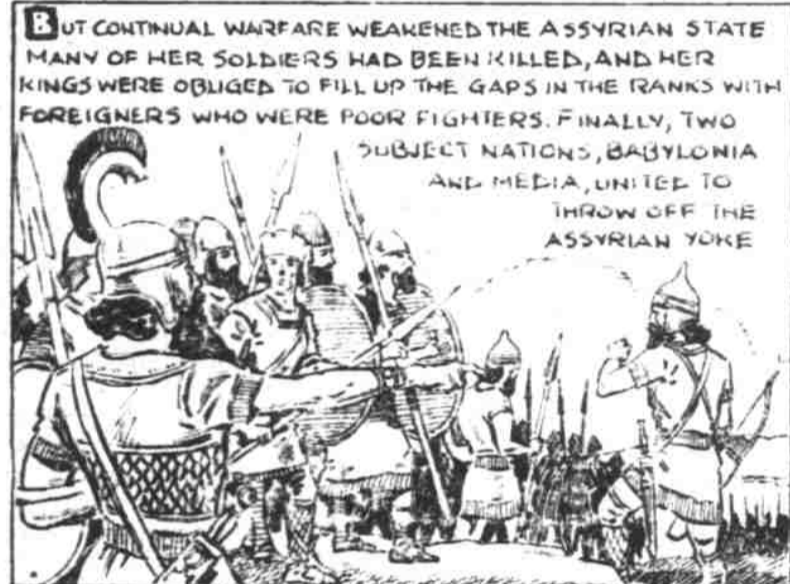
8 WITH THE SPOILS OF WAR THE ASSYRIAN KINGS BUILT GREAT PALACES IN THEIR CITIES ON THE TIGRIS, AND HAD RECORDS INSCRIBED ON THE WALLS BOASTING OF THEIR CONQUESTS AND THE MANY PEOPLE THEY HAD KILLED.



9 BUT CONTINUAL WARFARE WEAKENED THE ASSYRIAN STATE. MANY OF HER SOLDIERS HAD BEEN KILLED, AND HER KINGS WERE OBLIGED TO FILL UP THE GAPS IN THE RANKS WITH FOREIGNERS WHO WERE POOR FIGHTERS. FINALLY, TWO SUBJECT NATIONS, BABYLONIA AND MEDIA, UNITED TO THROW OFF THE ASSYRIAN YOKE.

10 ASSYRIA WAS ATTACKED FROM TWO SIDES. HER ARMIES WERE CRUSHED AND IN 606 B.C. NINEVEH, HER CAPITAL, FELL TO THE INVADERS. THE ASSYRIANS HAD NEVER SHOWN MERCY, AND RECEIVED NONE IN THEIR HOUR OF DEFEAT. THEY WERE KILLED TO THE LAST MAN.

11 NOT CONTENT WITH DESTROYING THEIR HATED OPPRESSORS, THE VICTORS TRIED TO WIPE OUT ALL REMEMBRANCE OF THEM, AND NINEVEH AND THE OTHER ASSYRIAN CITIES WERE REDUCED TO HEAPS OF BROKEN STONE AND BRICK.



12 THE PEOPLE OF MESOPOTAMIA WERE SO EAGER TO FORGET THE ASSYRIANS HAD EVER EXISTED THAT, 200 YEARS LATER, WHEN A GREEK GENERAL NAMED XENOPHON (WHO WAS MARCHING THROUGH THAT PART OF THE COUNTRY) NOTICED THE RUINS HE COULD FIND NO ONE WHO REMEMBERED EVEN THE NAME OF THE ONCE GREAT CITY.

13 TWENTY-FOUR CENTURIES AFTER THE FALL OF ASSYRIA, GRASS-GROWN MOUNDS BESIDE THE TIGRIS WERE ALL THAT REMAINED TO MARK THE SITES OF ITS CITIES. THE HISTORY OF THE ASSYRIANS, EXCEPT FOR MENTION IN THE BIBLE AND TRADITIONS IN THE WRITINGS OF GREEK AND PERSIAN HISTORIANS, HAD BEEN LOST. BUT, AT LAST, THE MYSTERIOUS MOUNDS AROUSED THE CURIOUSITY OF EUROPEAN EXPLORERS.

14 TWO MEN, BOTTA A FRENCHMAN AND LAYARD AN ENGLISHMAN, SET TO WORK INDEPENDENT OF EACH OTHER TO SEE WHAT LAY BENEATH THE MOUNDS, AND BY THE MIDDLE OF THE 19TH CENTURY THE FORGOTTEN SPLENDOR OF ASSYRIA HAD BEEN BROUGHT TO LIGHT. TODAY IF WE VISIT THE MUSEUMS IN OUR LARGE CITIES WE MAY SEE THE RELICS OF THESE ANCIENT PEOPLE FOR OURSELVES.

To all of which Mr. McCarthy's friends reply that Stuffy could have looked Cooney over for bog spavins and spring halt before closing the deal and that McCarthy was trading Kaufmann's right arm and not his disposition.

Just how far Stuffy will get with his kick, remains to be seen. Old "boss" traders could get a few pointers from most of the big league officials when it comes to trades. Speaking of Cooney.

This member of the famous baseball family seems to be one of baseball's nomads. He has been wandering about in the game for over 13 years and is still waiting to find a permanent home in the majors.

The Boston Red Sox had a string on him as early as 1913 and both the Tigers and Yankees looked him over before he became a permanent fixture in the Milwaukee infield for four campaigns — 1920-23. The Cardinals got him from the Brewers and after keeping him over a season, farmed him to Syracuse and then traded him to the Cubs. He joined the latter club in the spring last year.

Years later Cooney can refer to 1927 as "the year I made a tri-play unassisted and was traded to the Phillis." Just a few days before the deal Cooney retired the entire side in a game against the Pirates.
