

QUARANTINE ORDERS ISSUED BY STATE BOARD

State Board of Horticulture, under the authority conferred by section 1 of chapter 354 of the General Laws of Oregon of 1927, and section 4 of chapter 342 of the General Laws of Oregon of 1927, consider it necessary, in order to further prevent the introduction and spread of the alfalfa weevil (Phytophthorus pisticus, Gyll.) into the state of Oregon, that a quarantine be and the same hereby established at the boundaries of the state of Oregon, and from and after the publication of this order in three newspapers published within the state of Oregon it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to carry or transport alfalfa hay, and other hay and cereal straw, alfalfa meal, alfalfa seed, salt grass packing, bagged, emigrant movables, household effects, camping effects, camping implements, live stock, potatoes, nursery stock, used alfalfa meal, used alfalfa hay, and all machinery, implements, bags and other containers, that have been used in the milling, baling, harvesting or threshing of alfalfa, railroad cars, automobiles, automobile trailers, trucks and other vehicles from said infested territory except as hereinafter provided.

Regulation 1. Alfalfa hay and other hay and cereal straw and alfalfa meal, except as herein provided, that has been grown, manufactured or stored in the said infested territory is hereby prohibited from entering the state of Oregon for any purpose whatsoever, and upon the arrival of any such hay or straw or meal as quarantined against in this order, the same shall be immediately sent out of the state or destroyed at the option and expense of the owner or owners, his or their responsible agents.

Alfalfa meal or mixed meal which has been milled in the state of Oregon from mills which are infested territory from mills which are approved in writing by the president of the Oregon State Board of Horticulture as being so constructed and operated as to conform to adequate safeguard requirements for the prevention of alfalfa weevil infestation or contamination of the alfalfa meal, provided that all such alfalfa meal is sacked and shipped immediately after it is milled, such milling, sacking, and shipping to be done during the period November 1 to March 31, provided further, that such alfalfa meal is shipped in new or reclaimed burlap bags and loaded in tight railroad cars which are free from alfalfa hay, other hay and cereal straw and which have not been used in carrying alfalfa hay to the mill, and provided further, that the alfalfa meal, as above, is accompanied by a certificate signed by a state inspection official of the state in which the alfalfa meal originates, establishing the fact that all the alfalfa meal in the shipment has been milled, sacked and shipped in accordance with the above requirements. This certificate must also state the name and location of the mill which manufactured the product, the name and address of the importer in Oregon, the amount of the importation, the number and initials of the car containing the shipment and the date on which the alfalfa meal was milled. A copy of the certificate must be mailed at the time of shipment to the president of the Oregon State Board of Horticulture, Salem, Oregon. Any approval granted by the president of the Oregon State Board of Horticulture to any mill covering the shipment of alfalfa meal, as herein provided, shall be immediately sent out of the state or destroyed at the option and expense of the owner or owners, his or their responsible agents.

Regulation 2. The material known locally in the state of Oregon as "salt grass packing" shall be admitted into the state of Oregon, provided that each shipment of salt grass packing is accompanied by an official certificate signed by the chief pest inspector of the state of Utah, setting forth that all of the following requirements have been complied with, to-wit: That the material in the shipment was cut between the dates of October 1 and April 1; that the raking, shocking, stacking and baling or shipping of the material was not completed until the maximum daily temperature of the season had fallen below 60 degrees Fahrenheit, and that none of the material in the shipment had been held in the field from one season to another. All shipments of salt grass packing from the state of Utah must be accompanied by certificates as herewith provided for, shall be refused admittance into the state of Oregon, and the same shall be immediately sent out of the state or destroyed at the option and expense of the owner or owners, his or their responsible agents.

Regulation 3. The use of such salt grass as a packing material in shipments of alfalfa hay and other materials shall be permitted, provided it has been cut and removed from the field between October 1 and April 1, as above specified, and stored in warehouses remote from alfalfa fields, alfalfa hay or other suspected materials.

Regulation 4. All nursery and ornamental stock and other plants imported or brought into the state of Oregon from the said infested territory must be packed in such a manner as to prevent the alfalfa weevil from escaping, except in hay or straw, and each shipment must be accompanied by an official certificate establishing the fact that each package in the shipment has been fumigated for a period of one hour for alfalfa weevil in an airtight enclosure, subsequent to being boxed, baled or packed in such a manner as to prevent the alfalfa weevil from escaping, and upon the arrival of any such hay or straw or meal as quarantined against in this order, the same shall be immediately sent out of the state or destroyed at the option and expense of the owner or owners, his or their responsible agents.

Regulation 5. No shipment of household effects, or emigrant movables, originating in said infested territory shall be brought into the state of Oregon by any common carrier, person or persons unless accompanied by a sworn statement made in duplicate by the owner or shipper in accordance with the following forms, on blanks which will be furnished to applicants by the inspection officials of the state in which shipments originate, one of such duplicates designated as copy No. 1 to be mailed to the Quarantine Officer, Oregon State Board of Horticulture, Salem, Oregon, and the other of said duplicates designated as Copy No. 2 to be delivered to the common carrier agent, with a special certificate appended, to attach to the way bill:

Regulation 6. It shall be the duty of all common carriers to clean and free of alfalfa hay and other hay and cereal straw, all cars that have been used for the transportation of live stock, or alfalfa hay and other hay and cereal straw in or through any part of the said infested territory before the same enter the state of Oregon.

Regulation 7. Used alfalfa meal, machinery and other machinery, implements, tools, harvesting or threshing of alfalfa will be admitted into the state of Oregon from the said infested territory only upon compliance with the following requirements: Persons contemplating the importing or bringing into the state of Oregon any of the articles enumerated in this regulation shall first make application to the president of the Oregon State Board of Horticulture for a permit to do so, stating in the application the name and address of the exporter, the locality from which the shipment is to be made, a description of the articles for which a permit is requested, the terminal point of delivery and the name and address of the person in Oregon to whom the permit should be sent. Any and all shipments of such machinery and implements heretofore enumerated in the regulation imported or brought into the state of Oregon under authority of permit issued by the president of the Oregon State Board of Horticulture shall have attached to each shipment a certificate signed by the official entomologist of the state from which such shipment was made, showing the number of the permit to import and establish the fact that all machinery and implements included in the shipment have been cleaned and fumigated with hydrocyanic acid gas before being loaded for shipment, the date and place of fumigation, and the amount of cyanide used in the fumigation of the shipment covered by the certificate. Any and all shipments of such machinery and/or implements not accompanied by a certificate as provided for in this regulation shall be refused admittance into the state of Oregon, and upon the arrival of any such machinery and/or implements without a certificate as provided for, the same shall be immediately sent out of the state at the expense of the owner or consignee agent.

Regulation 8. Automobiles, automobile trailers, trucks and other vehicles from the said infested territory arriving in Oregon shall be placed in quarantine by the president of the Oregon State Board of Horticulture, his deputy or representative, in the district or county into which such vehicle arrives until it has been determined by inspection that the same is free from alfalfa weevil.

Regulation 9. Baggage, emigrant movables, household effects, household implements, camping effects, camping implements, used farming implements and other field appliances imported or brought into the state of Oregon by other than common carrier transportation from the said infested territory shall be placed in quarantine by the president of the Oregon State Board of Horticulture, his deputy or representative, in the district or county into which such articles are imported, until it has been determined by inspection that the same are free from alfalfa weevil.

Regulation 10. Alfalfa seed will be admitted into the state of Oregon from the said infested territory only when contained in bags or containers which have not been previously used for the carrying of alfalfa seed, other than reclaimed alfalfa seed.

This order supersedes Quarantine Order No. 16, issued January 20, 1926.

QUARANTINE ORDER NO. 8 Pertaining to the Colorado Potato Beetle

The fact has been determined by the President of the Oregon State Board of Horticulture that an insect pest injurious to the common potato, the Colorado potato beetle (Leptinotarsa decemlineata), new to and not heretofore widely prevalent or distributed within or throughout the state of Oregon, exists in the states of California and Nevada, and that all common potatoes are liable to carry said pest.

Now, therefore, I, Chas. A. Park, President of the Oregon State Board of Horticulture, under the authority conferred by section 1 of chapter 354 of the General Laws of Oregon of 1927, and section 4 of chapter 342 of the General Laws of Oregon of 1927, consider it necessary, in order to further prevent the introduction and spread of the Colorado potato beetle (Leptinotarsa decemlineata), into and within the state of Oregon, do hereby establish a quarantine at the boundaries of the state of Oregon against all common potatoes from said infested territory and from and after the publication of this order in three newspapers published within the state of Oregon it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to carry or transport any common potatoes into the state of Oregon from said infested territory, except as hereinafter provided.

1. Common potatoes will be admitted into the state of Oregon from the said infested territory only when accompanied by a state inspection certificate signed by the proper state inspection official of the state where grown, certifying that all of the potatoes in said shipment were grown in and sacked and shipped from a section free from the Colorado potato beetle, or if said shipment originated in a section where the beetle occurs, such certificate must establish the fact that all of the potatoes in said shipment have passed over a screen immediately prior to loading in the car, and have been placed in clean new sacks.

2. Potatoes to be imported shall not be used in connection with any shipment at any time.

3. All shipments of common potatoes not accompanied by a proper inspection certificate shall be refused admittance into the state of Oregon and will be immediately sent out of the state or

destroyed at the option and expense of the owner or owners, his or their responsible agent or agents.

This quarantine order supersedes Quarantine Order No. 14, issued October 20, 1925.

QUARANTINE ORDER NO. 10 Pertaining to Chestnut Blight

The fact has been determined by the President of the Oregon State Board of Horticulture that a plant disease injurious to the chestnut, the chestnut bark disease (Ectotheca parvatica), not known to occur in the state of Oregon, exists in several of the states of the United States, and that all varieties and species of the chestnut and chinquapin trees (Castanea sp. and Castanopsis sp.) are liable to be carriers of the disease.

Now, therefore, I, Chas. A.
