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JURY TO GET CASE IN LATE AFTERNOON

District Attorney Neuner Will Give State's Final Case This Morning

JACKSONVILLE, Or., June 20. (AP)—Final arguments of the defense in the trial of Hugh DeAutremont, alleged Siskiyou murderer, were partially closed this afternoon with the address of Attorney Gus Newbury, who will conclude with a 15-minute address in the morning.

An analysis of the evidence of the state was made in a three-hour talk of Attorney John A. Collier of Portland. Both attorneys argued that the state's case is built on theory, and a man cannot be hanged on theory. United States District Attorney George Neuner of Portland will make the last argument for the state tomorrow morning. The instructions of the court will be given in the afternoon and the case will be given to the jury about 3 o'clock, according to present indications.
