Normal Registration Largest in History

1102 in State Enroll First Week for Summer Classes

OREGON NORMAL SCHOOL. Monmouth, June 25.—(Special.)—Registration for the first six weeks of summer school at the Monmouth normal reached the record mark of 1102 at the close of the first week. This enrollment includes the 90 students taking work in the branch normal school at LaGrande, and also the students taking practice teaching in the several training centers. The registration will continue into the first of next week, but the present enrollment is an increase over last summer.
