Seventy-Fifth Anniversary of Congregational Church Observed with Services

The 75th anniversary of the organization of the Congregational church in Salem was observed on Sunday with services at the local church. On July 4, 1852, the church was organized by the minister, Rev. J. G. Goodell, and four members, I. N. Gilbert, Marietta Gilbert, Mrs. L. L. Williams and Albert Fellows.

Since its organization in 1852 the church has had 16 ministers, Rev. Charles E. Ward being the sixteenth.

An interesting feature of the anniversary services, which were in charge of W. I. Staley, Miss Margaret Cosper and Mrs. Mark McCallister, was the organization of an old choir. The singers were members of the choir more than 25 years ago.

For the evening services Dr. W. C. Kantner was the speaker. As a surprise to Dr. Kantner the chorists sang his favorite hymn, "The Lord of Love My Shepherd Is," a Shelley arrangement. Rev. E. F. Bollinger of Portland told of early days in Salem.

Following the morning services more than 75 members of the church motored to the home of J. C. Pokenberg at Macleay where a well-furnished basket dinner was served.

Greetings were received from the old pastors and many old members as well as visitors attended these anniversary services.

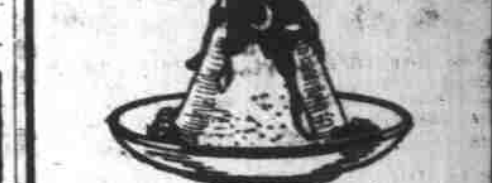
