MR. HANNON TESTIFIES AGAINST FORMER PARTNER
Charging that he knocked her down and assaulted her in their office on the afternoon of June 20, Mrs. Fred L. Hannon Monday afternoon testified in justice court against her former business partner, Dr. M. F. Lewis, when the case charging him with assault and battery appeared for preliminary hearing before Justice Brazier Small.

The case was taken under advisement by the court, and will come up for further hearing this morning, Justice Small announced.

The timber contended that its railroad was operated from Kerry to a point some 30 miles south, and was entirely within the state, and thus not subject to the regulation of the commerce commission.
