

### CRUISER PROBLEMS GAINING ATTENTION

Division of Ships Into Classes of 6 Inch and 8 Inch Guns Suggested

GENEVA, June 29.—(AP)—Britain has had no intention of contesting the principle of parity in the naval strength of the United States and Great Britain, W. C. Bridgeman, first lord of the admiralty, said tonight in an exclusive statement to The Associated Press.

The lord added that he was surprised to see that an impression seemed to prevail in some quarters that Great Britain was making for supremacy.

GENEVA, Switzerland, June 29.—(AP)—With the British now seemingly convinced that it is impossible to reopen the Washington treaty, at this time, without the consent of the United States, the delegates to the tripartite naval conference are focusing their attention on the problem of cruisers. This may take on a new angle owing to their emphasis on the wisdom of agreeing to a reduction in the caliber of the guns.

Experts are examining the feasibility not only of dividing cruisers into classes, but also the creation of two categories of 10,000-ton cruisers, one of which would be armed with 8-inch guns, as provided by the Washington agreement and the other with 6-inch guns.

Apparently the Americans are not pressing too hard the argument that 6-inch guns could easily be installed on swift merchantmen, thus according Great Britain an immense superiority by the conversion of liners into auxiliary cruisers in war time, because such an argument might in the long run, react against American national interests, if the United States should itself decide to develop a merchant marine.

There is seemingly no intention on the part of the American delegates to accept the British propos-

al whereby future cruisers would be limited to 7500 tons with 6-inch guns. This limitation would be contingent, under the British plan, upon an agreement concerning the number of 10,000-ton cruisers to be allocated to Great Britain, the United States and Japan.

At the present time vehicle operators are refusing to pay to Oregon cities the per mileage tax per passenger provided for in house bill 413 of the 1924 legislature covering the mileage through the city limits.

The constitutionality of the entire act is being attacked in the courts, but the case has not yet been tried.

The ordinance will come up for final passage next Wednesday at council meeting, and, it is said, all vehicle associations will appear to lobby against it.

### Pacific Air Flight Efficiency Evidence

RAPID CITY, S. D., June 29.—(AP)—From a far-away corner of the great northwest, President Coolidge looked out today upon a world in which the nation of which he is the head, was writing new chapters for history.

He sat in his bare and simple office in the high school building of a town of 8000, and heard of the successful termination, and the beginning of the Honolulu flight, and of a hazardous trans-ocean flight by Commander Byrd, and from far-off Switzerland came the most recent news of what is going on at the Geneva naval armament conference which this country sponsored.

As the word reached him through both press dispatches and from the war department in Washington that Lieutenants Matland and Hegenberger had arrived in Honolulu, Mr. Coolidge sent a cablegram of congratulations pointing out that they had added further to the already brilliant record of American aviation.

### While World Applauds Greater Feats Planned

NEW YORK, June 29.—(AP)—While the world applauded the achievements of Lieutenants Lester J. Matland and Albert Hegenberger, army aviators in flying from the Pacific coast to Hawaii, and watched with breathless interest the trans-Atlantic flight of Commander Richard E. Byrd and his crew the makers of the planes, motors and instruments today announced plans for airplanes capable of even greater feats.

The group included Anthony H. G. Fokker, designer and builder of both Byrd's America and the army planes that flew to Hawaii, and Charles W. Lawrence, designer of the Wright Whirlwind motor used in the America and the Hawaiian plane as well as in Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh's Spirit of St. Louis and Clarence D. Chamberlain's plane.

Fokker announced that he was constructing a plane that would be capable of remaining in the air for 72 hours, but he declined to say for whom or for what purpose it was being built. He did say, however, that the ship easily would be capable of making a non-stop flight from the Pacific coast to Tokyo.

"Within a year some plane will

have made this flight," he predicted.

Lawrence disclosed that his company is perfecting an improved motor of 270 horsepower, 50 horsepower greater than the one now in use. It will consume from 10 to 15 per cent less fuel than the present motor.

American success in long distance flying, Lawrence said, was due in a large measure to the use of small, light weight motors.

### WILD LIFE INVADES FARMS

ST. PAUL, Minn.—Protected deer and wild fowl of Minnesota have grown so numerous that they use farmyards in the northern part of the state for feeding purposes. Five farmers have asked damages from the state for injury of crops by deer or prairie chickens. One farmer, not far from the Twin Cities, said he counted 50 deer in his back yard at one time.
