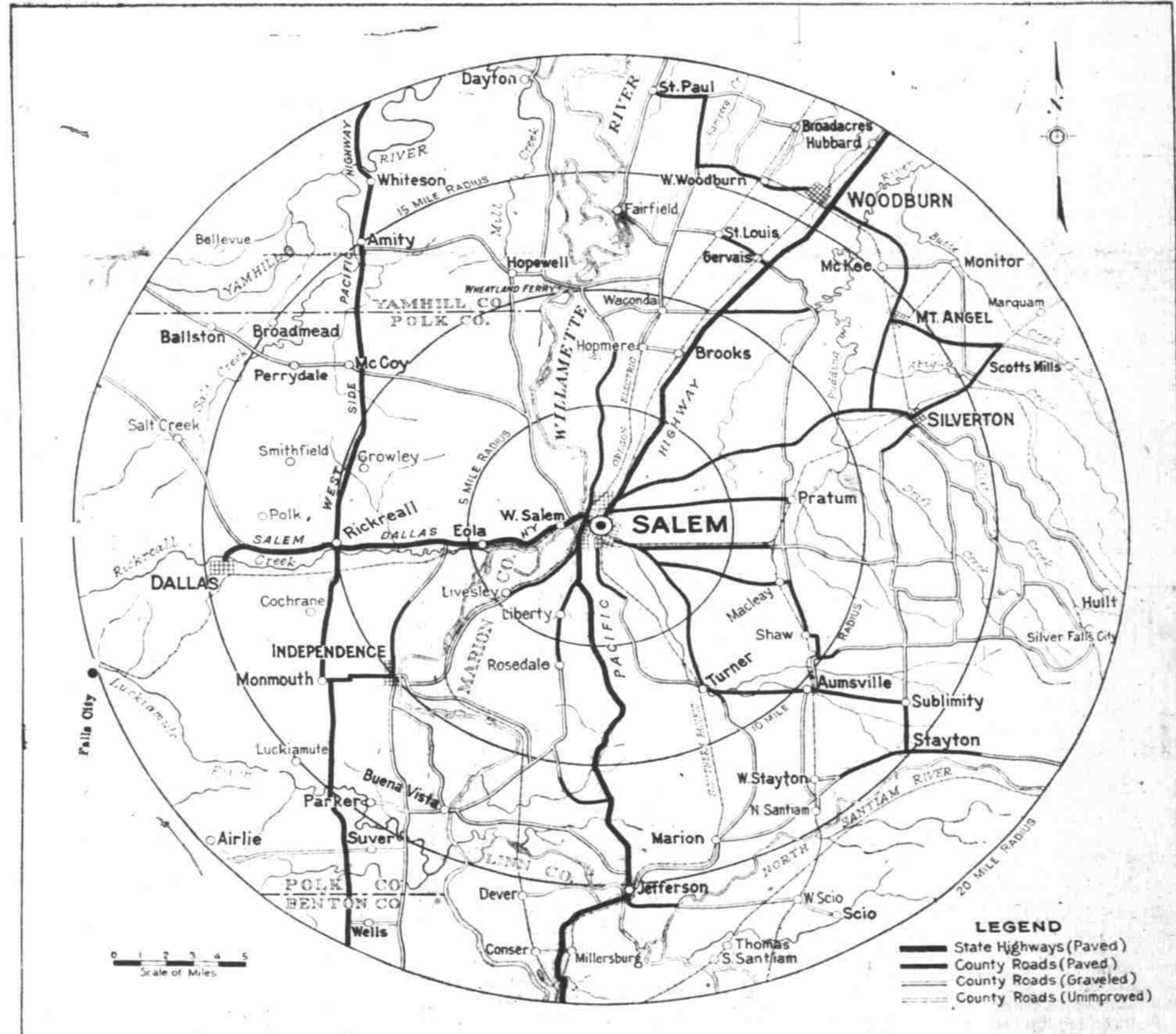
Monthly Business Meeting of Hal Hibbard Auxiliary Will be Held Friday
