FITZGERALD NAMED SUCCEED MARSHALL

Portland Man, Deputy State Labor Commissioner, On Accident Board

W. H. Fitzgerald of Portland was appointed by Governor Patterson Thursday afternoon as a member of the state industrial accident commission to succeed Wm. A. Marshall, veteran member of the commission who has resigned to accept a federal appointment as deputy commissioner in charge of the administration of the new federal seaman's and longshoremen's compensation act with headquarters at Salem.

Fitzgerald has for the past eight years been deputy state labor commissioner of the Portland office. Under the administration of Mayor Rushlight in Portland he was chairman of the police committee and a member of the Portland executive council. Fitzgerald has been a member of the cigar-makers' union for the past 35 years and for seven years was a member of the international executive board of that union.

Marshall, whose resignation was effective Thursday night, was first appointed as a member of the original accident commission in 1913 and has served on the commission ever since, being the representative or organized labor on the commission.

At an informal ceremony staged in the hall of representatives in the state house just before noon Thursday Marshall was presented

with a gold watch and a Shrine watch charm as tokens of the esteem in which he is held by his associates on the commission and by employees of the commission.

Presentation of the watch was made by Dr. F. H. Thompson in behalf of the Salem department and presentation of the charm was made by Dillard Elkins, former member of the commission, now in charge of the Portland office, in behalf of the Portland employees.

Marshall left here Thursday night in order to take over his new duties Friday morning.

Deny Need of Railroad Across Center of State

The Southern Pacific company in an answer to the complaint of the Oregon public service commission asking for the construction of an east and west rail line across central Oregon, attacks the constitutionality of the provision of the Interstate commerce act which authorizes the interstate commerce commission to require the construction of new rail lines upon a proper showing of necessity and convenience.

A copy of the answer which is filed with the interstate commission, was served upon the Oregon commission Thursday. The answer, while admitting that a vast area of central Oregon is unserved by rail transportation, contends that there is no necessity for such a development which would justify the expenditure which it would involve.

INCOME TAX LOSES BY GREAT MAJORITY

Total of 67,866 Votes Cast Against Measure Unofficial Returns Show

PORTLAND, Ore., June 30.—(AP)—Returns from all but 68 small and scattering precincts tonight showed the majority against the state income tax in Tuesday's special election to be 19,309. The figures were: Yes, 46,794; no, 66,103.

Official returns had been tabulated from eight counties, and complete unofficial returns had been received from 25 counties. Most of the missing precincts were in Douglas, Harney and Lincoln counties.

The figures on the other measures, from 1,782 precincts gave: Negro suffrage, yes, 67,866; no, 41,283. School tax, yes, 46,168; no, 55,116. Criminal amendment, yes, 60,522; no, 38,334. Legislators pay yes, 28,324; no, 79,830. Registration, yes, 54,866; no, 48,813. Salary measure, yes, 46,187; no, 60,876. Consolidation measure, yes, 40,816; no, 56,735. Veterans memorial, yes, 25,016; no, 78,859. Tax limitation yes, 19,342; no, 82,533. Assessment (blue blank) bill, yes, 31,529; no, 67,521. Nestucca closing, yes, 53,084; no, 46,533.
