"Post Office Gave Night Flying to the World" Says General New

WASHINGTON, June 30. (AP) Relinquishment at midnight tonight of the western section of the trans-continental air mail service between Chicago and San Francisco by the Boeing Airplane company, of Seattle, a private contractor, brings to consummation the original plan of the post office department in starting a government-operated air mail service. The eastern section between New York and Chicago will be relinquished by the government to the National Air Transport, Inc., of Chicago on July 31, at midnight.

"In building up this service," said Postmaster-General New today, "the postoffice department gave night flying to the world and created an organization which in the words of Colonel Lindbergh, 'is the envy of all Europe.'"

"In turning over to private interests the enterprise which has been so successful and which has required an immense amount of painstaking care and energy to construct the department is not leaving its child on a strange doorstep, as some are inclined to believe but is pushing it forth toward a greater and more glorious future where it will have the needed opportunity to grow and expand."
