

PHIL BAYES HOLDS VETERAN TO DRAW

MT. ANGEL, July 15.—(Special.)—Supporters of Bobby Gray, seasoned veteran of 200 fights, were disappointed here last night when Salem Phil Bayes held the battler to a draw in 10 hard fought rounds.

The two lads shifted into fast going from the first round and in the second canto Bobby was accorded his only definite round when he placed a right uppercut to the point of Phil's chin, sending Bayes to the floor without count.

The first and third rounds were called even by ringside experts, the other seven rounds being conceded to Bayes by the general following. In the sixth round Phil was punching his opponent at will and in the seventh he landed left and right hooks to the jaw and face, slashing Gray's left eye and causing the veteran to wobble.

Blood was shed generously by Bob during the remainder of the scrap. Bayes lost no blood, and was without a scratch when the bell ended the affair.

Salem fans who made the trip to Mt. Angel, were little pleased with the change to the judging system effected at the last minute before the fight when Bayes had been matched with the promise of a decision by referee.

Ted Fox, of Independence and Salem, leaped into prominence last night in the semi-final when he sent Salem Jimmy Fargo to sleep in the second round.

Fox, now in the featherweight class, fought like a veteran, knocking Fargo down just before the bell at the end of the first round. Fox has been indulging in hard labor for nearly a year since his last Salem fight with Billie Robbins. In these sensational events, Fox took two draws from Robbins who is now fighting main events in San Francisco and Los Angeles.

Matchmaker Harry Plant was among those of the Salem fans who made the trip to Mt. Angel. Fans who saw these fights are certain that Fox will draw good in Salem. Plant is wondering if Bayes and Gray would draw a good crowd here in the near future.

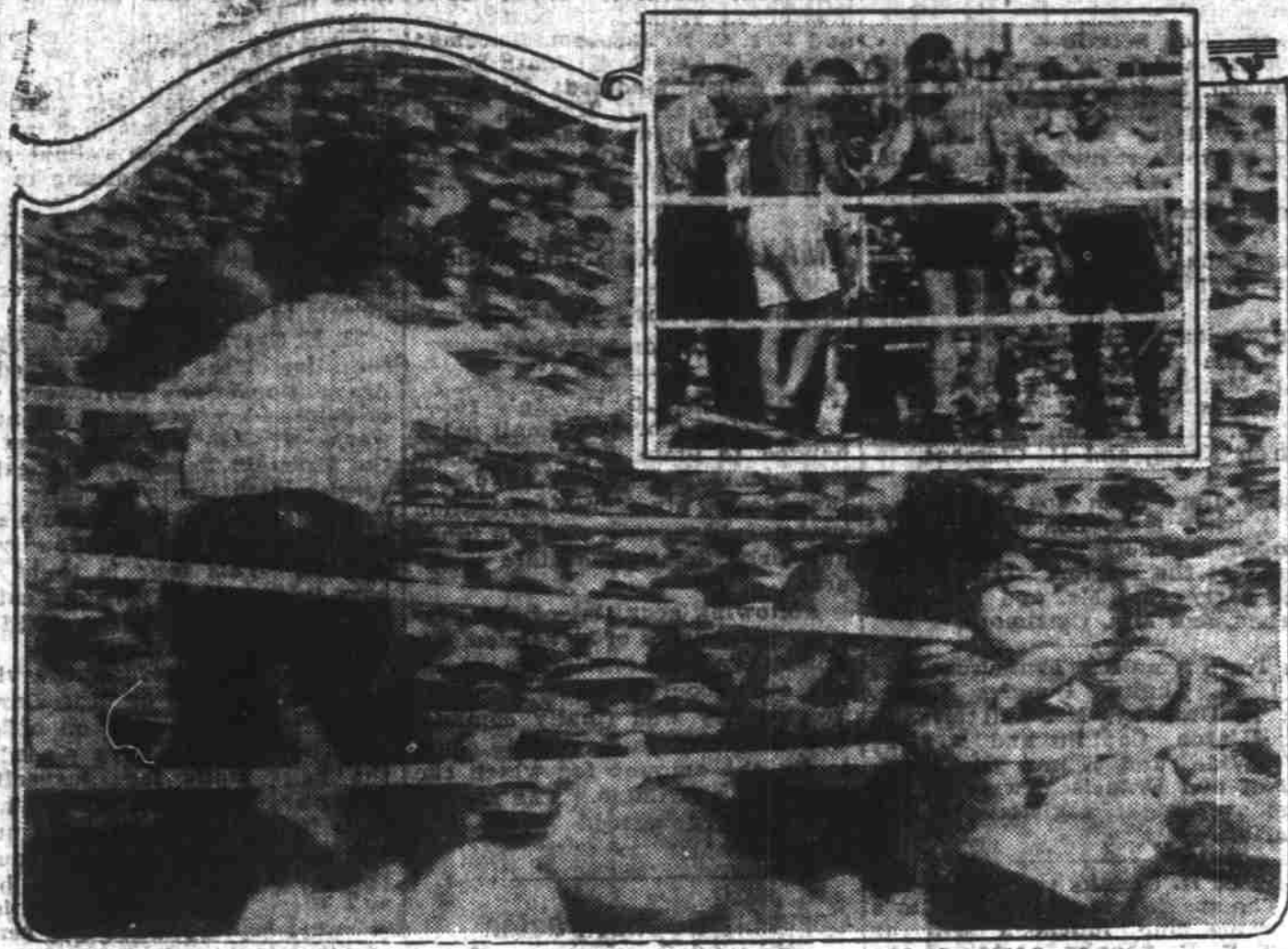

WHEN DEMPSEY ASCENDED THRONE

DEMPSEY EXHIBITS OLD TIME FEROCITY

WHITE SULPHUR SPRINGS, Saratoga Lake, N. Y., July 15.—(AP)—For just a half minute—brief interlude in an otherwise dismal workout—Jack Dempsey today swept aside seven years of pugilistic history and revealed the iron fisted youngster who crushed Jess Willard at Toledo.

After engaging for a round each with Tillie Kid, Herman, Dave Shade and Johnny Saxton, Dempsey took on Marty Gallagher for two half minutes. Gall was in close with the Washington youngster, clinching and punching half heartedly to the body.

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BOBBY WINS TITLE WITH RECORD SCORE

ST. ANDREWS, Scotland, July 15.—(AP)—Robert Tyre Jones, Jr., of Atlanta, Ga., today did more than win the open golf championship of Great Britain for the second time in two years. He used a record shattering score of 285 strokes for 72 holes as a match to fire the enthusiasm of thousands of spectators and would-be spectators as this shrine of golf has not seen in the memory of the oldest inhabitant.

His 285, representing four rounds in which he was never over par and held even with it only once, placed him six full strokes ahead of the next contestants and cut the same number of strokes from the record for the British open golf which Bobby himself equalled last year at St. Annas. The mark of 291 set by James Braid had stood steadfast against the assaults of great golfers since 1908. The record score was also a stroke under the mark for the American open, made by "Chick" Evans in 1916.

Aubrey Hooper and Fred Robson, British pros, were tied for second place at 291. Their accomplishment in equaling the old record would have created much excitement under ordinary circumstances. Today their performances were hardly noticed. Joe Kirkwood, a converted Australian, another galloping Georgian, planted the colors of Albany near those of Atlanta by scoring 293 and going into a tie with Ernest Whitcomb for fourth place.

Jim Barnes never quite reached his game and finished with 301. Hats went soaring in the air and fathers hoisted children to their shoulders to see the young man who is hailed as the greatest modern exponent of a classic pastime. Stolid old Scots, who have not danced a step for decades threw themselves into a highland fling with the utmost abandon as they danced about the smiling, modest young American. Motion picture cameras made a record of the whole wild scene.

"We admire Bobby Jones for his qualities as a man; his golf speaks for itself," said Colonel Henry Alexander Bethune, spokesman for the Royal and Ancient club, who handed the trophy to the twice crowned champion.

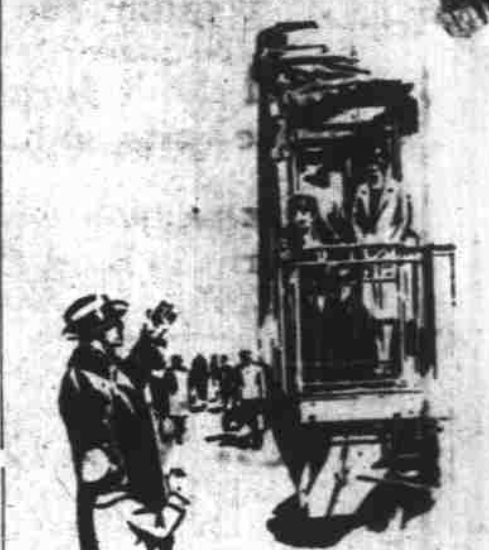
