

SURVEY INDICATES LARGER PRUNE CROP

Fairly Good Market Anticipated Despite Uncertainty as to Prices

PORTLAND, July 16.—(AP)—A general survey of the fruit crops of Oregon indicates that, while production may not be as large this year as in former years, higher prices will doubtless offset the decrease.

A shortage of apples is reported from practically all states, including Oregon, with the exception of Idaho. The five western states that rank in boxes are estimated to have 34,517,000 boxes as compared with 42,576,500 last year. For the United States as a whole, the commercial apple production is set at 24,179,000 barrels. The production last year was 23,095,000 barrels.

The total production of apples in Oregon this year is estimated at 4,655,000 boxes, a decrease in 1926 of 3,222,000 boxes from last year.

In California, a minimum of 10,000,000 boxes of apples has been put for fancy grade Gravenstein of large size, and 22 for medium size apples.

The new crop in Oregon is estimated at 1,222,000 bushels. In 1926, 2,100,000 bushels were grown. The report from the country at large indicates a corresponding decrease in production.

In Josephine county about half of the Bartlett pear crop has been contracted to canners at guaranteed minimum price of \$35 to \$40 a ton, it is understood.

The prune crop will be larger than was expected earlier in the season, it is now indicated. A fairly good market is anticipated although there is some uncertainty as to what prices will be paid.

DEATH TOLL MOUNTS IN EASTERN STATES

Ten More Succumb to Intensive Heat; No Relief Predicted Today

NEW YORK, July 16.—(AP)—Three persons were killed by lightning, and damage running into thousands of dollars was done by a storm which broke over New York tonight, bringing at least temporary relief from the three day siege of heat.

The storm, which broke shortly after 6 o'clock, raged for more than two hours during which torrents of water fell to the accompaniment of blinding flashes of lightning. The temperature, which stood at 86 at 5 p. m., had dropped 11 degrees within three hours.

NEW YORK, July 16.—(AP)—Ten more deaths were caused today by the heat that has baked the eastern states for the past five days, bringing the total deaths since the heat wave began to more than 70.

Four of today's deaths were in New York City, two were in Philadelphia, and there was one each in Newark, N. J., Ansonia, Conn., Buffalo and Woonsocket, R. I.

Continued warm was predicted for tomorrow and the sweltering public derived less comfort from the weather man's "probable showers" than it did two days ago when the same prediction failed to materialize. Temperatures hovered close to 90 degrees, and in many sections like New York City the temperature was the humidity did its part to make the combination as unbearable as before.

Beaches and lake resorts were expected to be crowded over the week end as they have not been thronged all summer and concession men were hoping to recoup some of the losses entailed by the belated warm season.

The heat deaths by sections for the past five days follows: Greater New York, 15; New Jersey, 16; Pennsylvania, 16; upper New York, 13; Connecticut, 5; Massachusetts, 5; New Hampshire, 1; Rhode Island, 1. Total 72.
