BUS FIRMS TRY TO DODGE FEES

PROTEST PAYMENT FOR OPERATION ON STREETS

City Thoroughfares, Though Paved Considered Unimproved, Claim

Bus operators in the state of Oregon have protested payment of fees for operation of their cars on city streets which, under a law approved by the voters at the last general election, are defined as unimproved highways.

The law on which the protest was based defines as unimproved highways all highways on which no money has been expended by the federal government, state or counties. City streets which, in most cases were improved by the municipalities are not defined in the act.

In event the city streets are construed as unimproved highways the mileage basis on which the fees of bus operations are calculated would be shortened materially with a corresponding loss in revenue to the state.

It was said that an effort would be made to reach an agreement between the state highway commission and the bus operators without appealing to the courts. Questions on which the highway department and the bus operators cannot agree will be referred to the public service commission.

The bus operators contend that they are exempted from payment of fees on city streets over which no money has been expended by the state, counties or the federal government.

TOWN NEARLY WIPED OUT

Damage Estimated \$100,000 Done in Fire at Govan, Wash.

WILBUR, Wash., July 19.—(AP)—Fire this afternoon caused damage estimated at \$100,000 when it wiped out over half the town of Govan, west of here, reports received here tonight stated.

The fire, said to have started from burning grass along the Northern Pacific railroad track, destroyed six warehouses, a hotel, the town hall, the C. W. Fredrickson general merchandise store, housing the postoffice and the telephone office, and more than half the residences of the town, the reports stated.

WORKERS' CLAIM DENIED

Completion of Railroad Held More Important Than Employes

CHICAGO, July 19.—(AP)—Representatives of 16,000 maintenance of way employees of the Chicago and Northwestern railroad, demanding a five cent per hour wage increase, were met by a statement today that their demands are secondary to the building of sections of the company's roadbed, between Chicago and Omaha, where trains are now traveling over rails that company officials said should have been replaced seven to eight years ago.

The plea that all available funds were needed to complete this work was made by G. T. Dike, chief maintenance engineer of the railroad, appearing before the United States mediation board in session here.
