## 75,000 TO SEE BOXERS CLASH IN RING BATTLE

Sharkey Ruled Favorite  
Radio microphones at the ring-side will carry the word picture of the fight over a nationwide hookup to from 15,000,000 to 20,000,000 other persons.  
Sharkey ruled a decided favorite tonight among the experts who have analyzed and weighed the chances of the two rivals. On the other hand Dempsey claimed the support of popular opinion in an apparent overwhelming measure, as well as the backing of many close observers.

Few, if any, previous big ring battles have developed as sharp a contrast of opinion. Where tonight Sharkey was backed strongly by a majority of newspaper critics and in wagers at odds ranging from 8 to 5 to as high as 2 to 1, Dempsey remained the firm choice of the fans in the street.

The experts' or rather the apparent majority favoring Sharkey, base the predictions on a victory for the rugged Boston sailor confidently on his youth, speed and superior boxing craft. He is 25 to Dempsey's 32. He has been fighting frequently and rising rapidly on the heavyweight scale in the past year and a half with decisive triumphs over Harry Wills, Mike McTigue and Jimmy Maloney to his credit. Dempsey has fought only once in four years and then, last September, a losing battle.

Dempsey, according to the expert minority supporting him, will win because, he has regained his old knockout punch, shaken off the legal worries that beset him a year ago and whipped himself into as good a fighting trim as it is possible for an athlete to acquire after a long lay off from actual competition. If the fight goes beyond five or six rounds it is generally expected Sharkey's assets in speed, stamina and boxing skill will be in his favor with a victory on points probably in his grasp in the event it goes the limit.  
Both fighters were in seclusion tonight, their conditioning completed and their handlers confident they had reached the peak of form. They will weigh in at the state athletic commission at 2 p. m. Dempsey is expected to scale around 186 and Sharkey about 194.  
Tex Rickard's traditional weather-luck seemed likely to prevail as a result of predictions of clear skies for tomorrow night.  
The preliminary fights are slated to start at 8:15 p. m. and the main bout at 10 p. m. eastern daylight time.
