There is a system of chaperoning in New York which does not exist in London, the debutante declares. Very few New York girls, she says, are allowed to accept offers of men to see them home, but must return home with a professional chaperon or maid. Such is not the case in London.

The fair visitor deprecates the American system of cutting in at dances, and prefers the English program system.

"There is no way of stopping anyone from dancing with you, even if you don't like him," she says, "and again, there is no way of keeping on dancing with someone you do like if someone else feels a desire to cut in. Another point in favor of the English system is that being with your partners for about a quarter of an hour gives you the opportunity of really getting to know the men you have just met."

### Four Hours in France's Army Wins Passport Home

PARIS—(AP)—Four hours service in the American army recently saved an Albanian laborer, Vasil Papadopolio, from waiting years for a visa to return to America. He was drafted in America, November 11, 1918, at 11:30 in the morning. News of the armistice came and he was discharged in the afternoon, getting one day's pay, \$1.00.

Papadopolio visited Albania. Since he had no American citizenship papers, he would have had to await his turn in the long list of applicants for quota visas.
