## "Padre of the Rains" Gets Astronomical Equipment

**SANTA CLARA, Cal., (AP).**—Modern and powerful astronomical equipment has been provided for the new observatory which the Knights of Columbus of California are giving to Father Jerome S. Ricard, S. J., venerable "Padre of the Rains."

The aged director of the University of Santa Clara observatory, who has been one of the principal exponents of the sun-spot theory of weather forecasting, soon will be able to pursue his meteorological work with the aid of a 60-inch reflecting telescope.

For years Father Ricard has not hesitated to issue monthly forecasts detailing the weather which can be expected 30 days ahead.

In recognition of his success in forecasting weather his friends raised \$50,000 to finance a new observatory.

The observatory will be 250 feet in length with a 50 foot central dome. On either side will be two smaller domes housing an eight inch refractor and an 18 1/2 inch reflector.

# BLACKMAIL VICTIMS OFTEN SOCIETY FOLK

## Impecunious "Gentle Folk" Frequently Involved in Shady Transactions

**LONDON, July 23.**—(AP)—Sensational cases which resulted in one blackmailer going to prison for life have revealed to Scotland Yard the existence of society go-between who supply the material used in extracting money from blackmail victims.

The blackmailer's assistants ingratiate themselves in the best society, and, through their privileged position, learn secrets that the persons affected would buy to keep from the world.

A former army officer, connected with a prominent family, made the acquaintance of the daughter of a wealthy man, and, in the guise of her lover, learned a secret of her past that she was anxious to keep from her father.

In due course the information was passed on to a blackmailer well known to Scotland Yard. One member of this gang after another approached her for hush money, and all the while the "lover" was drawing his percentage of their gains. Under the strain of it the health of the girl broke down, and she vanished from the house where she had been staying. Many months afterwards she was found dead.

Among the traffickers in secrets of value to blackmailers are spurious inquiry agents. Called in to look after the interests of clients in the hands of blackmailers, some questionable persons "double cross" their clients.

Sometimes the bitter is bitten, as in the instance of the son of a manufacturer, who had for more than five years eked out an exist-

ence by working with blackmailers at the expense of young fellows he trapped into indiscretions in his company.

The prospect of a brilliant marriage made it worth his while to give up his ways, but another member of the gang ferreted out his secret and from that moment the former ally of blackmailers was himself their victim. In the belief that he could get straight when he handled the dowry of his bride he had recourse to money-lenders to meet the demands of the blackmailers, but before the date of the wedding something leaked out and the engagement was broken. The man now is in South America, a fugitive from justice.

## Chamberlin Now "Cham" for He Left Berlin Out

**BERLIN (AP).**—Many Berliners call Clarence Chamberlain by the abbreviated name of "Cham." The appellation had its origin in a pun cracked when the "Columbia" descended first upon Eiselen and later upon Cottbus.

"We'll have to call Herr Chamberlain 'Cham,'" observed some wit who had been standing all night on Tempelhof flying field, when the news came that he had finally landed at Klinge, near Cottbus. "He has left out Berlin. Only 'Cham' remains."

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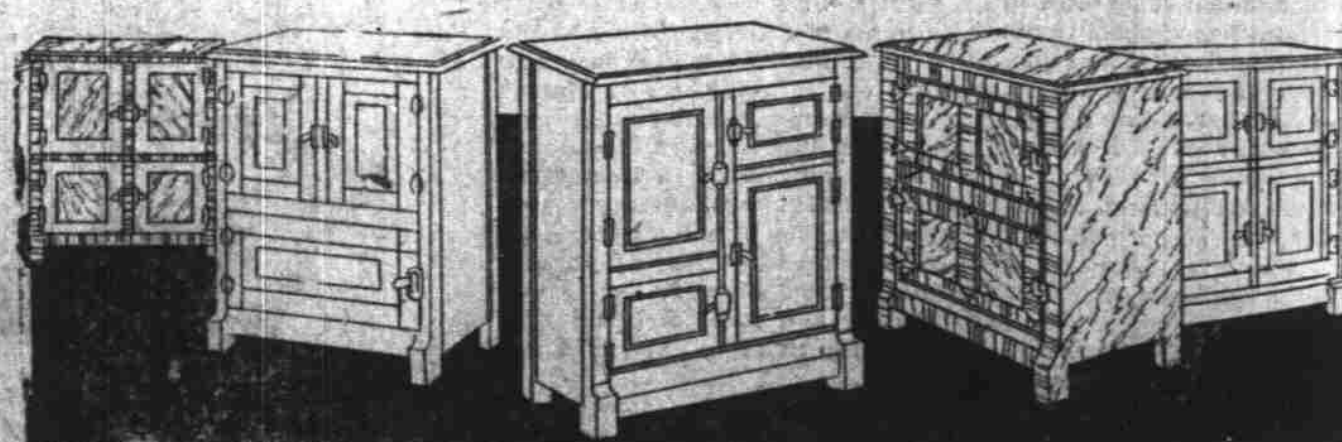
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
